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

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## Love the La La's

**F**or our cover story in this issue, Kristen Bieler, senior editor and lead taster on the wines of France's Rhône Valley, visited Philippe Guigal and his family at their winery and labyrinth of underground cellars in Ampuis.

Philippe is the son of Marcel and grandson of Etienne Guigal, the namesake of family-owned wine business E. Guigal. While the Guigals own estates throughout the Rhône Valley, including in Châteauneuf-du-Pape and Tavel, and also source grapes for their popular Côtes du Rhône, the family is deeply rooted in the Northern Rhône appellation of Côte-Rôtie.

It is in Côte-Rôtie that Etienne first set his sights on La Mouline, a steep, terraced vineyard of old Syrah vines. Coupled with the family's subsequent single-vineyard cuvées of La Landonne and La Turque, the three Guigal bottles pictured on our cover are together known as the "La La" wines and are among the most coveted trophy wines from the Rhône. The 2019 cuvées, the current vintage release, achieved two 96-point scores and a 97 in recent *Wine Spectator* blind tastings, once again affirming their reputation for excellence and collectability.

In contrast to these lavish wines, which retail for around \$700 each, Bieler found the hardworking Guigal family to be humble about their accomplishments. "What I find as impressive as their success is their reputation throughout France. Friends, competitors and neighbors not only admire and respect them, but feel a genuine fondness for the Guigal family. Their integrity and humility are second to none."

Indeed, the producers of the Rhône are collectively indebted to the Guigals for laboring to raise the prestige of the region across many decades. In tasting nearly 650 wines for our annual Rhône Valley report (beginning on page 46), Bieler found a wide range of quality across the 2021 vintage, which was fraught with challenges, including spring frost, rain and cool weather. She rates the overall vintage 87 in the North and 88 in the South.

A vintage like this requires selectivity in buying, but bright spots do exist among winemakers who declassified fruit to bolster their lesser wines or practiced highly selective sorting. The best wines show elegance, and optimism remains for many of the top producers who have yet to release their 2021s.

**T**he 2021 vintage delivered challenges of a different nature in Washington state, where senior editor and lead taster Tim Fish chronicles the hottest growing season on record. However, his initial tastings are encouraging, with a projected vintage rating of 90–93 and a number of vibrant Rhône-style red blends and Syrahs topping the list.

Beginning on page 80, Fish profiles Yakima native and screen actor Kyle MacLachlan, who is also a hands-on wine producer.



His Washington label, Pursued By Bear, has earned the admiration of fellow winemakers and consistent scores of 90 points or higher in *Wine Spectator*'s blind tastings.

Finally, I'd like to direct your attention to an exciting update from Ireland and the world of whiskey. The current renaissance taking place in Ireland has resulted in scores of new and innovative distilleries. At the same time, veteran producers like Bushmills and Jameson are upping the ante with luxury whiskeys aged in excess of 20, 30 and even 40 years. Jonny McCormick, contributing editor and senior taster for our sibling magazine *Whisky Advocate*, has rounded up some of the superpremium pours that may change your perception of this spirit.

I hope you enjoy this issue and share it with your friends.

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## Wine Trapped in Retailer Bankruptcy

In a section of a Napa Valley warehouse, more than half a million bottles of wine rested on pallets stacked 30 feet high until last month, when workers slowly began sorting through them. Every bottle was purchased by customers of Underground Cellar, an Internet retailer boasting 24,000 clients. Among a variety of perks, Underground Cellar promised it would store wine for free until customers requested delivery.

But last April, one of Underground Cellar's lenders called in an \$8 million loan, pushing the firm into bankruptcy. All that stored wine, instead of belonging to the firm's customers (who had already paid for it), abruptly shifted to the control of a court-appointed trustee. That set up an ugly legal fight.

Underground Cellar was founded by Jeff Shaw, 38, with a tempting promise: Buy wines at good prices and you might get better wine than you paid for. A company subsidiary acquired wines in bulk purchases from wineries, distributors and auctions. It then packaged the wines by themes. The firm attracted customers with a twist—they might get upgraded to wines worth more than what they paid, including exclusive cult wines like Harlan, Bond and Screaming Eagle.

Shaw was removed as CEO of Underground Cellar by its board in March 2022. He says the board was looking for a “moonshot, maybe even being the next Snapchat.” A new CEO was brought in, and the \$8 million loan was secured from a large financial firm called TriplePoint Capital. (Neither TriplePoint's CEO nor its counsel responded to request for comment on this story.)

The company had been doing well during the pandemic, when people were drinking more at home. But last April, a message first appeared atop the company's homepage stating that it had “shut down for all future ordering and shipping.”

The loss of the right to their wine did not sit well with many customers. “I want to clearly state that the stored goods are my property,” one of the disgruntled customers told a Delaware bankruptcy court judge at a hearing in October.

“Having paid for something is not the same as owning it,” retorted a lawyer for TriplePoint. Until the stored wine was physically delivered to purchasers, TriplePoint argued, it was still owned by the debtor's

estate. As such, the wine was subject to TriplePoint's lien on the assets of the bankrupt firm.

The trustee's original plan had been to sell Underground Cellar's assets (negligible except for wine) to Liquid Lotus, a new entity formed by Shaw. The cash portion of Shaw's offer was \$600,000. Shaw agreed to allow all Underground Cellar customers to recover their wine free of charge. But then several other potential buyers stepped in, ready to pay more. That meant the trustee was obligated to conduct an auction. TriplePoint filed a winning bid of almost \$5 million. Only \$500,000 of that bid was cash—the rest is a “credit bid” of \$4.5 million, a portion of the unpaid loan.

Initially, TriplePoint floated a plan requiring customers to pay a hefty 30% surcharge over a wine's suggested retail price, plus shipping costs, before releasing it. Customers appealed to the trustee. In the testy battle that followed, TriplePoint agreed to reduce its surcharge to 21% of the actual price paid by customers for their wine. All requests to buy back customer wine had to be received by email or postmarked by Dec. 8. After that, the wine belonged to TriplePoint. Many customers complained about stiff shipping fees. As of January, workers were scrambling to try and fulfill the orders they had received.

Had Jeff Shaw won back the company he created, he says his ultimate goal was to “rebuild the brand and its community of wine buyers.” Instead, he is now just another customer with wine stranded in the warehouse—“about 50 cases, mostly Napa Valley Cabernet.” Will he pay 21% of their value, plus fees, to retrieve them? Shaw thought a moment before responding, “I don't know if I'll even bother to do that.” □

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# Allegrini Family Divides Wine Company

One of Italy's top wine families is dividing its company in two as a new generation plays a larger role.

The Allegrini family, one of the leading names in Amarone wine, is restructuring its estates and companies in Veneto's Valpolicella region and Tuscany's Bolgheri and Montalcino areas. Once the arrangement is finalized, brothers Francesco, Giovanni and Matteo Allegrini will acquire majority holdings of the Allegrini estate in Valpolicella and its négociant label, Corte Giara, managing the companies with their cousin Silvia Allegrini.

Their aunt, Marilisa Allegrini, and her daughters Carlotta and Caterina Allegrini, will shift their winemaking focus to Tuscany, retaining ownership of Poggio al Tesoro in Bolgheri and Poggio San Polo in Montalcino. They will also continue to run the family's chief hospitality operation, the Villa della Torre luxury hotel in Fumane, Valpolicella.

It's a dramatic separation in a premier wine family, and reaching an agreement was challenging. "The choice to take a different path from that which was traced historically by the Allegrini brand was not easy," said Marilisa, "especially on a sentimental level."

"For some time now, my brothers Giovanni and Matteo, and myself, have embarked on a journey that has formalized with the acquisition

of the majority of Allegrini and Corte Giara—an important step, born with the aim of ensuring a solid future and an innovative push to the companies, driven by our enthusiasm and based on significant foundations built over time," said Francesco Allegrini.

The surviving senior family member, Marilisa has dedicated four decades to growing Allegrini's production, sales, name recognition and overall success. Following the death of her father, Giovanni, in 1983 at just 63 years old, a young Marilisa worked alongside her brothers: Walter, who died unexpectedly in 2003, and Franco, who succumbed to cancer in early 2022. Silvia is Walter's daughter; Francesco, Giovanni and Matteo are Franco's sons.

The company produces more than 300,000 cases of wine annually from its Veneto and Tuscany estates, with annual sales of more than 30 million euros.

In addition to the wine estates in Tuscany, the Villa della Torre property includes 40 acres of vineyards. Marilisa also owns 25 acres in Veneto's white wine-producing Lugana appellation. "So my family company—me with [my daughters] Carlotta and Caterina, we will have plenty of things to do," she said.


## Mouton Rothschild Lets the 2021 Vintage Soar

Château Mouton Rothschild has unveiled the artwork for its 2021 label, featuring a painting by award-winning artist Chiharu Shiota. The art depicts the silhouette of a single human figure holding strings attached to an exuberant floating cluster of what could be balloons or grapes, evoking the fragile balance between nature and humans.

"The four lines connecting the human to the environment represent the four seasons—winter, spring, summer, autumn—and all the emotions linked to them—solitude, hope, achievement," said Shiota. "It is like preserving the memory of the year in the wine. I find this very fascinating because I also believe that the objects that surround us accumulate our memories and existence."

Shiota was born in Japan and currently lives in Berlin. Her work has been displayed in leading art institutions around the world, including the Hammer Museum in Los Angeles, the National Museum of Asian Art at the Smithsonian, the National Museum of Art in Osaka and the Power Station of Art in Shanghai. "When I visited Château Mouton Rothschild, I was very inspired by their relationship with nature. They depend on the weather and do not interfere with Mother Nature. They accept the conditions in which the grapes grow. I think Mouton is holding onto the balance of human and nature."

# Palm Beach Food & Wine Festival Dazzles With Sips and Sunshine



More than 5,000 food and wine lovers attended the festival, which included 26 events across four days in sunny South Florida.

Sunshine and fine wine were on the menu as top names from the world of food and wine gathered for the 16th annual Palm Beach Food & Wine Festival. Founded in 2007 by David Sabin and Lindsay Autry, the festival has grown steadily and marks another big leap forward with its first year in partnership with *Wine Spectator*.

This year's festival took place Dec. 7–10 and attracted more than 5,000 attendees across 26 world-class events at prestigious venues including the Four Seasons Resort Palm Beach, The Breakers, Marcello's La Sirena, Café Boulud, Buccan and more.

An annual highlight, the Grand Tasting presented by The Palm Beaches, attracted more than 2,000 revelers to the Palm Beach County Convention Center, where they were greeted by delicious bites and sumptuous sips from more than 50 restaurants and 64 wineries, each pouring a wine rated 90 points or higher in by *Wine Spectator* editors in their blind tastings.

The showcased wines spanned 10 countries. Among the many gems were Bodega Numanthia Toro Termanthia 2015, Caymus Cabernet Sauvignon Napa Valley Special Selection 2013, Château Pichon Baron Pauillac 2018, Diamond Creek Cabernet Sauvignon Napa Valley Volcanic Hill 2019, Kistler Chardonnay Sonoma Mountain McCrea Vineyard Athearn Estate 2020 and Quinta do Noval Vintage Port 2018.

The event also gave guests the opportunity to meet some of the amazing people behind the outstanding wines. Among the many winemakers in attendance was Gianlorenzo Neri from Casanova di Neri, pouring his Brunello di Montalcino Tenuta Nuova 2018. "I think it is a very nice and entertaining format," he said as music pulsed in the background. "It's not just a tasting but an experience."

*Wine Spectator* subscribers Bob and Kathy Schlesinger traveled from Philadelphia to attend the festival, including the Grand Tasting. "It's been a surprise for me to see how upscale the wineries are here. Most of the time you just don't see that at this type of event," said Kathy while sampling two of the California Pinot Noirs on hand, bottlings from Bouchaine Vineyards and Merry Edwards Winery.

Bill Terlato, CEO of Terlato Wine Group and Terlato Wines, divided his time at the tasting among several wineries from his portfolio, including California's Sanford and Chimney Rock, and Lanson Champagne, which poured its 2012 vintage.

"I didn't know what to expect, but there are a lot of very knowledgeable people here," Terlato said. "And the food is really exceptional. You can tell the chefs are very excited to show their expertise." Delectable bites included something for all tastes, from sushi to truffled grilled cheese and Korean spare ribs to beet tartare.

Great food has been the cornerstone of the event since its founding, and over the four days of the festival, guests had the chance to attend numerous lunches and dinners with some of the world's most

renowned chefs, including Daniel Boulud, Marc Forgione, Stephanie Izard, Alon Shaya, Mason Hereford and Michelle Bernstein, to name a few.

Chefs from out of town partnered with local restaurants for the meals, allowing guests to see collaborations such as Boulud joining chef Marcello Fiorentino in the kitchen at the *Wine Spectator* Grand Award-winning restaurant Marcello's La Sirena for a blockbuster dinner.

The Grand Tasting provided a bold finale to the weekend's festivities. "We have decades of experience in building signature wine events such as the New York Wine Experience," said Marvin R. Shanken, editor and publisher of *Wine Spectator*, as he attended the event. "I see here great potential to bring a new group of consumers to fine wine in a way that is fresh and fun for everyone."

Bringing live entertainment to the stage were two competitions—a Mixology Contest and the Grand Chef Throwdown presented by

Creekstone Farms. Jenna Crum, a mixologist at Florie's at the Four Seasons, won the cocktail battle. And chef Diego Suero of Honeybelle, a restaurant at PGA National Resort in Palm Beach Gardens, took home the Throwdown prize.

A portion of ticket sales went to the designated charity for the event—the Els for Autism Foundation. Co-founded by Shanken, Ernie Els and Liezl Els in 2009, the foundation operates the Els Center of Excellence, a world-class, 26-acre campus and learning center in Jupiter, Fla., for individuals with

autism. The festival raised approximately \$50,000 for the charity.

It also raised \$25,000 for the Robert Irvine Foundation, which benefits military families and first responders, and \$10,000 for Season to Share, a community program that helps families in need in Florida's Palm Beach and Martin counties.

The 17th annual Palm Beach Food & Wine Festival will take place Dec. 12–15, 2024. □

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# Jasper Hill Farm: An American Original

In 1998, Andy and Mateo Kehler, then in their late 20s, bought an old farm way up north in Greensboro, Vermont.

Then they hatched a plan.

“Andy and I had a two-year conversation, and what we arrived at was ‘meaningful work in a place we love,’” recalls Mateo, now 54, one year his brother’s senior. Jasper Hill Farm, which was named after a previous owner and lay dormant, is not far from Lake Caspian, where their family has summered since 1924.

Though five other local dairy farms failed the same year, the Kehlers chose farmhouse cheesemaking as their vehicle. They sold their first batch in mid-2003 and quickly won accolades as up-and-comers in the American artisan movement. A contract with the large farmer-owned coop Cabot to age and market its clothbound Cheddar soon followed.

In their first two decades, the Kehlers cemented Jasper Hill’s reputation as an industry leader. And they took giant steps toward achieving their dream of reviving the local economy: Now the largest employer in Greensboro, with a staff of about 75, Jasper Hill supports six small area dairies, paying them a premium for their milk to supplement the output of its own 200 cows.

Jasper Hill’s lineup of American originals to compete with their European counterparts delivers on its motto: “a taste of place.” Perhaps most impressive is the Kehlers’ knack for not only launching delicious new cheeses but continually improving on enduring favorites.

Though relatively large for a farmstead, Jasper Hill exhibits a characteristic of smaller industry colleagues: Its cheeses consistently proffer rich, fundamentally sweet and mild yet persistent flavors of fresh farm milk and cream, with added notes of earthiness and grassiness. This reflects the Kehlers’ focus on pasture management.

“We crop almost 1,000 acres,” explains Zoe Brickley, the farm’s director of communications and e-commerce. “We don’t own all of it, but we’re able to be good stewards of our local landscape, so we can get a better feed product and avoid having to truck in a lesser one.” To up their pasture game, they pursue regenerative strategies such as carbon sequestration, soil-building and greater plant diversity.

In 2016, the Kehlers initiated a microbiology program based on studies of their cheeses’ rinds by Drs. Rachel Dutton and Benjamin Wolfe (see “Rind Me Up: Turophilic Microbiology,” Sept. 30, 2017, issue). Dutton gave them a gene sequencer to identify exact strains of microbes. “It allows us to harness our *terroir* in a less chaotic way,” explains Brickley.

Their response to the pandemic was typically bold: In 2021, they expanded their on-site creamery, doubling down on production. Since 2019, Jasper Hill’s annual output of raw milk cheeses has nearly tripled from 160,000 to 470,000 pounds.

As part of this expansion, they salvaged copper-lined vats from a Comté-maker and connected them to an automated curd-handling system, which mimics traditional techniques while eliminating much of the backbreaking labor. One of the first batches of a new cheese made in those vats, Whitney, won Best in Show at the 2022 American Cheese Society gathering—a rapid ROI to say the least.

Augmenting the new creamery, they built a kitchen to propagate their own starter cultures and rennets, another method of incorporating indigenous microflora to maximize flavor potential that’s rare among U.S. cheesemakers. “To me, it’s the coolest and most legit thing we’ve done in the past few years,” says Brickley.

“These are all investments in the tools that enable us to push our quality to the next level,” says Mateo Kehler. “Deliciousness and qual-

ity are our only competitive advantages. Focusing on deliciousness is the most important aspect of what we do."

This spring brings the launch of two new cheeses—Caspian, a French tomme style, and Withersbrook Blue, which is dosed with a Québécois-style hard ice cider. A recent tasting of a Withersbrook prototype showed it to be unique, with stellar potential. Meanwhile, a Caspian preview

was another highlight: With a delightful semisoft consistency and smooth, fudgy texture, it delivered a dollop of lactic tang balanced by pleasant chalky notes, some earthy hay/straw ones and hints of fried onions. Meanwhile, its rind gave off some intriguing raisinlike aromas and a whiff of wet autumn leaves. (For more info, go to [jasperhillfarm.com](http://jasperhillfarm.com).)

## A TASTE OF JASPER HILL FARM

**1 ALPHA TOLMAN** (*raw cow's milk Alpine-style; \$17 for 8 ounces*) Some lurking barnyardy funk is wonderfully encapsulated in sweet lactic and nutty flavors, resolving to a distinctly Gruyere-like aftertaste.

**2 BAYLEY HAZEN** (*raw cow's milk natural-rind blue; \$18 for 8 ounces*) To rival the finest Stilton, elegant and restrained, with plenty of alkaline bite and saltiness balanced by bitter-sweet, sweet cream, herbaceous and nutty notes.

**3 CABOT CLOTHBOUND CHEDDAR** (*pasteurized cow's milk; \$17 for 8 ounces*) Loaded with masterfully balanced, well-integrated flavors, including a good measure of mouthwatering acidity offset by some creamy sweetness; a hint of musty cellar ferment; and chocolatey, nutty and savory meaty notes.

**4 MOSES SLEEPER** (*pasteurized cow's milk Brie-style; \$34 for 1 pound*) Starting out demure, sweet and mild, with a whisper of lactic tang, it fills your mouth with rich, creamy heft while its rind imparts subtle woody and briny aromas.

**5 WHITNEY** (*raw cow's milk; \$17 for 8 ounces*) Made in the style of raclette, it's mild and mellow, with well-integrated complexity and outstanding balance between lactic sweetness and tang with a touch of fruitiness for good measure.

**WILLOUGHBY** (*pasteurized cow's milk washed-rind; \$18 for 8 ounces*) With a pretty pinkish-orange tint, it retains all the mild, creamy sweetness of its Brie-like sibling, Moses Sleeper, adding some peaches-and-cream fruitiness, a bit of extra tang, some yeasty funk and meaty heft.

**6 WINNIMERE** (*raw cow's milk washed-rind bark-wrapped; \$35 for 13 ounces*) Lively herbaceous, bright floral, piney and citrusy notes rest on a creamy foundation, with added hints of lactic tang, savory meat—think grilled hot dog with mustard—and some stimulating funk.

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# Hospices de Beaune Raises \$27.4 Million

Few things are as captivating to Burgundy lovers as a packed auction selling more than 750 barrels of the Côte d'Or's greatest wines from the latest vintage. The historic Hospices de Beaune wine auction, conducted by Sotheby's, raised a grand total of \$27.4 million at its 163rd sale in November. The amount marks the second-highest total in the event's history, behind 2022's \$32 million total. Proceeds will support winery modernization and the construction of new buildings at the Hospices Civils de Beaune—which has operated charity hospitals for nearly 600 years—and will fund medical research on aging and longevity.

The annual sale is often considered an indicator of how the new Burgundy vintage will be priced. Mounir Saouma, who makes wine in Burgundy and the Rhône and has supported the auction since 1995, told *Wine Spectator* that since 2005, the wines of the Hospices have been “in the top of the hierarchy in terms of finesse and quality.” The auction, he continued, is “a great event [that reminds] us that wine is also charity.”

Albéric Bichot, proprietor of Albert Bichot and a longtime supporter of the auction, said in a statement, “The results of the Hospices sale are extraordinary, and I'm delighted to see the mobilization of the industry in support of this institution and the fine causes it supports.” Bichot was the top bidder of the auction and purchased 156 barrels in total, including 43 from *grands crus*.

Average barrel prices were down by about 16% for reds and 13% for whites this year. There were also almost 50 fewer barrels sold compared with 2022. The drop in prices may indicate some reservations over the quality of the 2023 vintage, which was marked by a rainy spring and a hot, stormy summer. To Bichot, the lower prices aren't necessarily a bad thing: “For many wines, we're back to prices that will arouse the interest of former aficionados of the event, which is rather pleasing.”

Auctioneers rotated over seven hours to sell 753 barrels of 2023 Burgundy. More than 700 participants from 24 countries bid on 51 different cuvées sourced from across the Hospices' 150 acres of vineyards, which are in their final year of being converted to organic farming. In a sign of buyers' continued enthusiasm for white Burgundy, three barrels of Bâtard-Montrachet *grand cru* Cuvée Dames de Flandres sold for more than \$380,000 each, and the five total barrels of Bâtard-Montrachet on offer surpassed the price of last year's equivalent barrels by 14%.

One highlight of the sale, at more than \$380,000, was the *Pièce des Présidents*, a unique barrel specially designated each year by the Hospices to support particular charities. This year, proceeds will support the Foundation for Medical Research and the Initiative for Research on Healthy Longevity. The wine is a Mazis-Chambertin *grand cru* that will age in a barrel crafted with leftover wood from one of the 220-year-old oak trees used to restore the spire of Notre Dame cathedral.

Notably, this year's average price decrease is the first since 2016. But Saouma reflected that auction results don't always give clear signals on future pricing: “The human factor is very important.” □

## Music Legend and Wine Lover Quincy Jones Puts Rare Bottles Up for Sale



Wine and music lovers had a rare chance to snag a delicious piece of history in December. In its last auction of the season, Christie's sold bottles from the personal wine collection of music legend Quincy Jones, whose

career includes playing trumpet with Lionel Hampton, producing Michael Jackson's *Thriller*, arranging for Frank Sinatra and Count Basie and more.

The online sale featured more than 150 lots from Jones' cellar, including Bordeaux first-growths, *grand cru* Burgundy and top names in Champagne, Napa and more—many in large formats. “We eagerly anticipate celebrating not just the wines but also the enduring passion of a true maestro,” said Bonnie Brennan, president of Christie's Americas.

Jones, 90, has had a free-ranging career spanning music, film, publishing and beyond. After getting his start as a trumpeter, he became a sought-after conductor, arranger and producer, working with the most influential musicians of the 20th

century. He has been nominated for a record 80 Grammy Awards and won 28.

He discovered a passion for wine during his travels abroad as a young touring musician. In a statement, he remembered, “When I was embarking on my first trip to Europe as a young trumpeter in Lionel Hampton's band in 1953, the great saxophone player Ben Webster pulled me aside and gave me some of the best advice a 19-year-old who had never traveled outside of the country could ever receive. He told me that the soul of a country is identified by its music, its food and its language and that ‘wherever you go, eat the food the real people eat, listen to the music the real people listen to, and learn 30 or 40 words in every language.’” —K.M.





## Tone Woods and Wine

**W**hile researching for a new acoustic guitar, I came across a lot of information about the various types of woods used in guitar-building. It occurred to me that tone woods are to an acoustic guitar what grape varieties are to wine.

Grapes have certain flavors, structures and profiles, based on variety and where they are grown, that impact the wines made from them. Woods used in the construction of guitars impact the sound, frequencies, balance, sustain, appearance and finish of the instrument.

And like a person's preference in grape varieties, the desired sound of a guitar is subjective, a matter of personal taste and experience. Also as with grapes, even if made from the same woods, each guitar has its own voice.

Generally speaking, hardwoods like rosewood, mahogany, walnut, maple and more exotic woods like African blackwood, cocobolo and ziricote are used for the back and sides of an acoustic guitar. They act like the cabinet of a speaker. The top, or soundboard, is typically a softer wood like spruce, cedar or redwood. The top vibrates when the strings are plucked, creating the sound.

Most acoustic guitar tops are spruce, however the stiffness of the wood varies depending on whether it is Sitka spruce, Adirondack spruce or Alpine, sometimes called “moon” spruce. Alpine spruce is sourced from high-elevation forests in Austria, Germany and Switzerland. It grows slowly, therefore is tight-grained, and it is harvested during a moon phase when the sap flow is inactive. After cutting, the tree rests with the top facing downslope to drain its sap. It reputedly makes a stiffer soundboard that is more responsive.

Spruce's combination of light weight, stiffness, strength and elasticity makes it ideal for clarity and brightness of notes. It's also straight-grained, for even distribution of sound, making it an all-round choice for strumming, flatpicking or fingerstyle guitar playing. Cedar and redwood deliver softer, rounder tones while retaining clarity, often sought by fingerstyle players.

Rosewood is popular for the back and sides of an acoustic guitar for its projection of and length of sound, or sustain (think “finish” of a wine). Brazilian rosewood is the most highly prized,

however since 1992, it has been protected by CITES (Convention on International Trade of Endangered Species), making it difficult to find and expensive. From time to time, guitar makers will offer special-edition acoustic guitars made with Brazilian rosewood from stocks purchased prior to 1992; most often, East Indian rosewood is used.

If you really want to geek out about tone woods, look to Chris Alvarado of Driftwood Guitars, who feels not all Sitka spruce has the same characteristics and sound, despite being fantastic wood for a guitar's soundboard. He speaks about the differences in each piece of wood, depending on its age and source. Similar to grapes and wine, Alvarado likes to know the “story” behind the piece of wood, where it grew, what the climatic conditions were; higher elevation, windblown trees tend to grow slowly and be more flexible. He cites four examples of Sitka spruce, including one from a bridge in Alaska built at the turn of the 20th century and another from a 3,000-year-old log buried under a glacier, also in Alaska. The latter had minerals and soil leached into it, giving it a unique color and sonic properties.

Analogous to a fine wine's evolution, the best acoustic guitars sound different over time. Both wine and wood are “alive” in the sense that they are influenced by changes in humidity, temperature and air pressure. Over time, the soundboard becomes drier and thus more resonant. The wood also becomes more stable and resistant to environmental factors. Though there are scientific explanations for these changes, the changes in tone and responsiveness of a guitar are subjective—much like whether one prefers young or aged wine.

If you're wondering about the result of all this research, in 2019 I purchased a dreadnought with a Sitka spruce top and East Indian rosewood back and sides. It has a glossy finish. My new acoustic is an OM (orchestra model) body shape, with moon spruce top and mahogany back and sides and satin finish. It looks completely different, but more importantly, sounds different, with less highs and lows, but very tight, clear and crisp mid-range tones. The dreadnought is a beast, with a little longer sustain; the OM more elegant and punchy. It's fun to play both.

## Italian Label Lingo

At the end of last year I spent some time visiting wineries in Italy's most northerly wine region, Alto Adige, where I had a chance to catch up on the region's most recent major initiative: the introduction of *Unità Geografiche Aggiuntive* (UGA), or additional geographic units, to wine labels.

UGAs, first approved under Italian wine law in 2016, are a way for DOC- and DOCG-designated appellations to further define the larger region via delimited growing areas. The process takes into account naturally occurring regional and geographic boundaries, historical and cultural factors. For example, Chianti Classico divided the 30-mile-long appellation and 17,000 acres of vines into 11 UGAs for its *gran selezione* wines.

The genesis of UGAs lies with *Menzioni Geografiche Aggiuntive* (MGA), or additional geographical mentions. MGA was introduced prior to UGA and now is an accepted term under the UGA umbrella; *Contrade* in the Etna DOC and *Rives* in the Conegliano Valdobbiadene Prosecco DOCG are other examples of UGAs. Beginning in 2007, Barolo drove the adoption of MGAs when cartographer Alessandro Masnaghetti set out to map the region, ultimately identifying 181 MGAs that were codified under Italian wine law in 2010.

But even before UGAs, producers in Alto Adige were looking for ways to further define their wines. Elena Walch winery began using "Vigna" on relevant wine labels in 2014 after the term was approved to signify a single-vineyard bottling (usually with stricter production regulations) a few years earlier. "We were very strong believers [in putting Vigna on the label] because in Alto Adige there is no DOCG. So we finally had a tool to show that our [sites] were approved, true single-vineyard names, as opposed to fantasy names," said Karoline Walch, referring to the prevalence in Alto Adige of using non site-specific *cuvée* names on labels.

Alto Adige also has six approved subzones that producers adhering to specific regulations and with vineyards within these subzones may use to bring greater definition to the DOC. Subzones and UGAs may seem similar, and in terms of identifying where a wine is from within a larger appellation they serve the same purpose. However, the approval process for subzones is even more

difficult: They go beyond geographical boundaries to recognize only wines of a certain style and character, and while subzones have the possibility to one day become their own DOC, UGAs do not.


Despite these labeling provisions, the majority of the appellation's wines are bottled simply as Alto Adige, making it challenging to understand its diversity of wine styles in the context of *terroir* and origin. Alto Adige is long and narrow, with vineyards spanning roughly 90 miles from north to south and encompassing 11,000 acres of vines. With 12 high quality cooperatives in the region, that vineyard acreage is spread among 5,000 growers, with many owning tiny slices of vineyards. The Dolomites create an interplay of sun and shadow over the vines that has a dramatic impact on the finished wines, as do prevailing winds from the mountains and nearby Lake Garda. Add to that a complex patchwork of soils and a wide variety of both red and white grape varieties, about 20 in total.

All of these factors suggest that Alto Adige would benefit from the approval of UGAs, but getting there wasn't easy. Mapping the individual UGAs happened relatively quickly, with consensus among area producers and the regional consortium reached in 2017. But approval by the Italian ministry of agriculture didn't come until 2020 and finalizing implementation took additional time; 2024 vintage wines will be the first allowed to utilize the UGA labeling, which means we won't see them in the U.S. until 2025 at the earliest.

Ultimately, 86 UGAs were approved for use on the labels of Alto Adige wines. About 25 are in use on labels at the moment—without being identified as UGAs—by wineries bottling wines produced from grapes sourced from tighter vineyard areas. But many other wineries already have well-established *cuvée* names that have nothing to do with the location of the wine's grape sources, typically blending grapes from multiple sources. Adjusting the blend to allow for the use of a UGA may not be worth it for these wineries.

I'm always in favor of additional information on wine labels, and I hope more wineries will add UGAs to their labels. But even after all of the hard work to establish the UGAs, only time will tell just how widespread and impactful the initiative will be.

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# THE ENDURING GREATNESS OF Guigal

With a new “La La” cuvée and an expanding foothold in the Southern Rhône, Côte-Rôtie’s most important family writes its next chapter

**T**he story of Guigal begins with La Mouline, a small plot of ancient vines that cling to the steep slopes of Côte-Rôtie in the Northern Rhône. Wine lovers recognize the name as one of the most cultish, cherished wines in the world—it’s the original of Guigal’s trio of icon wines, followed later by La Landonne and La Turque (together referred to as the “La La” cuvées).

Long before La Mouline fetched more than \$500 a bottle upon release, and even many decades before its 1966 debut vintage, which kick-started Côte-Rôtie’s revival, this parcel of vines captured the imagination of a 14-year-old Etienne Guigal. It was the 1920s and he was working as a migrant farm laborer, hired to pick apricots nearby, when he first set eyes upon the gnarled old Syrah vines held in place by Roman-built terraces. At the time, Côte-Rôtie’s vineyards had been largely abandoned—they were considered too difficult to farm and there was no market for the wines in a war-ravaged France.

“Etienne was bored with apricots—he was fascinated by the hillsides and the vines,” says Philippe Guigal, Etienne’s grandson, who today is at the helm of Famille Guigal. “Locals would say that the vines in La Mouline made better wines, so it became his dream to one day own that vineyard.”

With a tenacity that turns out to run in the family, Etienne worked tirelessly for decades, and by 1946 he’d saved enough money to start his own domaine, E. Guigal. Two decades later, in 1966, he and his son, Marcel, finally made good on his childhood vow to purchase the 1-hectare La Mouline plot on the Côte Blonde hillside of Côte-Rôtie. “We are a family of workaholics,” Philippe confesses. “My grandfather made wine for 67 vintages, and even two hours before his death in 1988 he was still tasting in the cellars.”

The rebirth of Côte-Rôtie and its ascendance to the pantheon of the world’s most rarefied wines can be credited largely to Etienne, Marcel and Philippe Guigal. Today they own 10% of Côte-Rôtie’s vineyards and their empire has expanded well beyond those borders, with estates throughout the Northern and Southern Rhône. The Guigals have also built a thriving négociant business, buying grapes and young wines from a network of growers. In recent years, growth has only accelerated, with the 2017 purchase of Châteauneuf-du-Pape’s Château Nalys and Château d’Aqueria in Tavel in 2022. All together, the Guigal family produces close to

10 million bottles a year, about 3% of all Rhône wine.

“When I became winemaker in 1997, we were at 2 million bottles; we owned just 9 hectares of land and now we have 250 hectares,” Philippe shares, adding that he’s careful not to boast of the company’s exponential expansion under his leadership. Years ago, Philippe’s father bragged to his own father, Etienne, when he reached the 1 million bottle mark. Etienne’s response: “I grew the company from zero to 17,000 bottles. No one can beat that rate of growth.”

**G**UIGAL'S TOP CUVÉES are opulent, commanding, hedonistic and showy, but the family is the opposite of all these things. Success and succession have done remarkably little to change the family’s culture and connection to their humble origins. “We are people that always have a little bit of earth on the bottom of our shoes; we are very close to our land and our soils,” Philippe explains.

Watching Philippe trek up the vertiginous terraced vines of the La Reynarde vineyard—the fourth and yet-to-be-released La La cuvée in the family—it’s easy to see why locals had wanted to ditch vineyard work for factory jobs and fruit trees. Côte-Rôtie’s slopes are pitched at more than 45 degrees in many places and vines appear to defy gravity. Navigating the zig-zag pattern of stone walls in the La Moulaine vineyard feels like climbing an upright corn maze; La Reynarde’s rows are much more orderly by comparison. But it’s all still extreme viticulture, requiring difficult and time-consuming hand labor.

Philippe explains how the La Reynarde site had lain fallow for a century before he decided to plant vines here in honor of the birth of his twin boys, Etienne and Charles, in 2010. Flanked on both sides by vineyard parcels owned by the Jamet brothers, La Reynarde offers stunning views of the Rhône river below and the small town of Ampuis, the Guigals’ spiritual and literal home.

The new La La vineyard serves another strategic purpose, Philippe shares: to engage the fourth generation in the family business. It’s a trick he stole from his forebears. “My father and grandfather were very smart—they planted La Landonne when I was born, and always told me that it was my vineyard, so as a child I always wanted to walk there and felt a deep sense of pride for that place.”

These single-vineyard cuvées put Côte Rôtie on the map for wine collectors decades ago. Comparing and contrasting each wine’s profile and personality has become a sport for many wine lovers. Stay tuned, fans: In 2026, the inaugural release of a fourth La La will join the lineup. ▶

## La Mouline

**THE BACKSTORY:** A tribute to the first generation, it's the original "La La" and the single-vineyard wine that changed the course for Côte-Rôtie with the debut 1966 vintage.

**THE VINEYARD:** The oldest vineyard site in Côte-Rôtie, a 1-hectare parcel on the Côte Blonde with vines dating to 1893.

**THE WINE:** Considered the most finessed and elegant of the three La La cuvées, thanks to Blonde's lighter soils and the addition of 11% Viognier. Spends 42 months in new oak. Philippe describes it as the "most Burgundian" of the trio.

**IN ART:** Philippe compares La Mouline to *The Birth of Venus* by Sandro Botticelli, which shows the goddess of love and beauty arriving on land, illuminated with divine light and showered with roses. "This classical painting illustrates the subtle balance of La Mouline, its delicacy and elegance," says Philippe.



## La Landonne

**THE BACKSTORY:** Planted in 1975 by Marcel to commemorate the birth of Philippe; the first vintage was 1978. "Because it was planted for my birth, I've always seen it as my cuvée," says Philippe.

**THE VINEYARD:** In the La Landonne *lieu-dit*, on the Côte Brune and planted to 100% Syrah in iron-rich soils. With southeasterly exposure and 45 degree incline, grape skins grow thicker.

**THE WINE:** Brooding, massive and firmly structured, the most powerful of the La Las, with incredible longevity in the cellar. The only one of the three to be fermented with 100% whole cluster, and this extra tannin structure explains the power and weight. It's also the only La La named for the specific *lieu-dit* it is in (the others are cuvée names).

**IN ART:** Philippe compares La Landonne to *Girl with a Pearl Earring* by Johannes Vermeer, a simple portrayal of beauty featuring a mysterious girl before a dark background with a direct gaze. "Classical illustration of a local character, we are seduced by the simplicity and the power that this painting provides. It reminds me of the famous sentence: an iron fist in a velvet glove. So typical of La Landonne," says Philippe.

## La Turquie

**THE BACKSTORY:** The third La La, this launched with the 1985 vintage and honors the "genius of the second generation."

**THE VINEYARD:** Acquired with the purchase of Vidal Fleury in the early 1980s and planted to 93% Syrah and 7% Viognier. *Terroir* is Côte Brune, but it's very close to the Côte Blonde side, which imparts elegance.

**THE WINE:** In between La Mouline and La Landonne in terms of power, with pronounced spicy character. Powerful, with deeper color and richer profile than La Mouline, and velvety tannins.

**IN ART:** Philippe compares La Turquie to *Under the Wave off Kanagawa* by Hokusai, an intense yet simple illustration of a tsunami in motion, with a sharp foam tip. "The representation of Hokusai is not as classical as it seems, expressing the energy, the dynamic, of La Turquie," says Philippe.



## La Reynarde

**THE BACKSTORY:** The fourth La La to join the family, planted for the birth of Philippe and Eve's twin sons, Charles and Etienne, in 2010. Named after the stream that runs between *lieux-dits* Côte Brune and Côte Blonde.

**THE VINEYARD:** Parcel of 100% Syrah located on the Côte Brune side in the *lieu-dit* of Fongéant, nestled between plots owned by Jean Paul Jamet and Jean-Luc Jamet.

**THE WINE:** Philippe wanted to wait until a "great vintage" to bottle the first release. The debut 2022 will be released in 2026. Forty months in new *barriques*. "For me, it's between La Turquie and La Landonne in style," says Philippe. Silky, polished tannins and a lot of dark, smoky power and density.

**IN ART:** Philippe compares La Reynarde to *The Kiss* by Gustav Klimt. A hymn to love, it's a dreamlike scene filigreed with gold of an abstract couple, evoking passion and tenderness. "The harmony of this famous painting highlights the echo between the couple, balancing density, power and extreme refinement in La Reynarde," says Philippe.

Collectors won't be able to get their hands on a bottle of La Reynarde until 2026, when the inaugural 2022 vintage will be released. Barrel tastings in Guigal's cellar already reveal a wine with extraordinary concentration and depth—highly unusual for vines so young. “*Terroir* expresses very quickly from this site, even in young vines,” Philippe explains. “La Reynarde has shown me that vine age is important, but not totally essential, particularly in such special *terroirs*.” Like the other La La cuvées, La Reynarde will possess nearly unmatched aging potential, he is confident; longevity is a Guigal hallmark.

Of course, achieving character and complexity at this apex comes at a cost: In addition to being expensive to farm and harvest (Philippe estimates labor costs are three to six times higher here than on flatlands), the soils are unstable and terraced stone walls are required to keep vines from eroding and washing down the slope in a rainstorm.

“We employ a team of 18 people year-round to rebuild all of our walls—it is a crazy, never-ending job because they are always crumbling in places,” he explains. “We spend 700,000 euros a year on wall construction—it’s a cost that no other region has.” A living monument to the Côte-Rôtie, the walls are a patchwork of history, with original parts built by the Romans, Art Deco-style sections dating to the 1920s, and some stretches just completed. “This is difficult viticulture. But if you don’t do it, you will lose your vineyard. If you don’t invest in walls, you are not investing in your future.”

It’s a ROI calculation that makes sense with the prices Côte-Rôtie cuvées fetch today, but must have seemed like insanity in Etienne’s early days when he was trying to revive the hillside viticulture and

one-man locomotive in an appellation that stalled for decades. While he busily replanted vines and acquired new hillside plots, three-quarters of Côte-Rôtie’s vineyards remained deserted. The price of orchard fruit continued to command more than twice the price of wine grapes. Yet he remained convinced of the region’s greatness, observing firsthand how grapes from the slopes yielded more intensely flavored, concentrated wines than those harvested on the valley floor. Literally translated as “roasted slope,” Côte-Rôtie benefits from maximum sun exposure and wind protection, which allows Syrah to ripen in an unusually cool climate.

When Etienne went blind in the early 1960s, his only child, Marcel, left school to take over in the cellar. He was just 17 years old. “This was the worst time for the appellation,” Marcel, now 80, recalls. “Everyone said Côte-Rôtie was finished.” While Hermitage, the other famous slope in Northern Rhône, was enjoying increasing international celebrity, the wines of Côte-Rôtie remained largely invisible.

Changing this equation would require massive quality upgrades, Marcel knew. “I

wanted to continue with my father’s vision, but the few producers here were not focused on quality. We would have to work very hard to change the reputation.”

**I F THERE WAS AN INFLECTION POINT** for the region, it was Marcel’s decision to bottle the grapes from La Mouline as a single-vineyard wine, after an unusually long *élevage* in new oak. This would become Côte-Rôtie’s first trophy wine—though certainly not overnight.

“In the 1960s we were selling Côtes du Rhône for \$1.99 a bottle and Côte-Rôtie for \$4.95,” recalls Guigal’s first U.S. importer, Fred



the market for the wines was nonexistent. But hardship and hard work were not foreign for Etienne. Working since the age of eight, he never attended a single day of school. “My grandfather told me stories of tending cattle barefoot in the snow, because they had no money for shoes,” Philippe recalls.

Etienne landed a job working as a cellar hand at Vidal Fleury in 1924 when he was just 14 and eventually climbed the ranks to cellar master. He married Marcella, a maid at the nearby historic Renaissance manor of Château d’Ampuis, and was later forced to take a break from making wine to fight in WWII on the Tunisian front.

After launching E. Guigal upon his return, Etienne became a

Ek. “I tasted the first vintage of La Mouline in barrel and it was very good, but we had to charge \$12.95 a bottle for it—and that was expensive, so it was a hard sell in the U.S.” Ek had discovered the Guigal family by accident, on a detour making his way from Burgundy to Châteauneuf-du-Pape, and they developed a lifelong friendship. “The Guigals are a very special family, very remarkable people—incredibly loyal and humble. The secret to their success? Hard work. The pressure on their business is extraordinary, but they have not changed in character since they began.”

Their style of wine has also remained unaltered. “I found old books from the beginning of the last century that described how Côte-Rôtie’s best wines were aged for a very long time in new oak barrels,” Marcel recalls. “I knew that long *élevage* was very important for these wines.” The debut 1966 vintage of La Mouline spent 40 months in oak barrels—long by today’s standards, but decidedly radical back then. This is exactly how the wine is made today.

Meanwhile, Etienne’s intuitive understanding of *terroir* remained his superpower, despite his lack of eyesight. While Marcel was busy upping quality in the cellar, Etienne was hunting for prime *terroir*. He tracked down the multiple owners of a steep, abandoned vineyard in the La Landonne *lieu-dit* on the iron-rich soils of Côte Brune, purchasing small parcels bit by bit in order to connect a 1.8 hectare plot. Marcel and Etienne planted its vines in 1975, to celebrate the birth of Philippe, and the first vintage of their La Landonne was 1978. The *lieu-dit* has become one of the most famous in the Rhône, and Guigal’s vineyard has many famous neighbors today, including Delas, Gerin and Rostaing, who all make single-vineyard La Landonne cuvées. In 1985, La Turquie was born,

completing the La La trilogy. By then the world was taking notice and the tectonic shift for the region was in motion.

With interest in Côte-Rôtie growing, Marcel knew the appellation had to expand in size in order to accommodate the new vigneron. In the 1980s, he persuaded the head of the INAO (the French organization that regulates wine regions) to allow Côte-Rôtie to grow by 5% each year—French law limits growth to 1% annually. “Growing five times the national average—this is how we made the appellation,” Marcel says. “You need a young generation, it was essential for the Côte-Rôtie. And I was very pushy.”

The Guigal family’s advocacy for the region is not lost on their neighbors across the Rhône. “Their influence on the Northern Rhône is second to none. I have so much admiration,” says Marc Perrin of Château de Beaucastel. “They care only about the long term. They never compromise on quality and cultivate their own style—they are one of the greatest families in the world of wine.”

Success funded additional acquisitions. In 1984 the Guigals bought Vidal-Fleury, where Etienne had started working when he was 14, and in 1995 they acquired Château d’Ampuis where Etienne’s wife, Marcelle, had once labored as a maid. Today, this is the personal home of Philippe and his family, as well as the name

## THE MUSEUM OF LE CAVEAU DU CHÂTEAU

“To fully understand Côte Rôtie you have to understand the past,” says Philippe. “And you appreciate wine more when you understand how much effort it takes to produce it.” In 2019 the Guigals opened their wine museum in Ampuis, which introduces visitors to the history of vineyards and winemaking in the Rhône dating back to Roman times. The collection was built over 60 years by the Guigal family and contains historical tools and memorabilia connected to winemaking—worth a stop for any visitor in the region. Post-tour tastings are a must: Walk-ins can sample around 30 wines from across the Guigal range in the Tasting Room, and themed tastings for small groups with top cuvées can be arranged in advance. | 6 Route de la Roche, Ampuis



of an important cuvée. They tripled their vineyard holdings in 2001 with the purchase of Domaine Jean-Louis Grippat and Domaine de Vallouit, which enabled them to craft their first Hermitage in 2001: the Ex-Voto white and red, produced only in exceptional years. In 2006 they purchased a Côte-Rôtie neighbor, Domaine de Bonserine. Guigal owns in almost every Northern Rhône appellation. “All that is missing is Cornas,” Philippe says, adding, “We will buy in Cornas.”

**CÔTE-RÔTIE** is often described as the most Burgundian of the Rhône *crus*. While Guigal’s wines—muscular, powerful, richly structured—sit decidedly outside the Burgundy paradigm, the approach to viticulture is analogous. “People talk about the many distinct *lieux-dits* in Burgundy, but the diversity of *lieux-dits* in Côte-Rôtie is unmatched,” says Philippe. Whereas in Burgundy the differences in *terroir* have been cataloged over centuries by Cistercian monks, the specificity and uniqueness of Côte-Rôtie’s 77 *lieux-dits* are still being discovered.

Syrah is the red grape of all Northern Rhône appellations, from Hermitage to St.-Joseph to Cornas, but it expresses itself differently in Côte-Rôtie, showcasing the grape’s signature blackberry, raspberry and violet matched with a distinctive, earthy savoriness marked by wet leaves, smoked bacon fat and a wild gamy character. It’s the only Northern Rhône appellation that permits a small

amount of the white Viognier grape to be co-fermented with Syrah, which explains the exotic floral note that many wines possess.

Yet Guigal’s wines occupy their own stylistic sphere, on the far right of the powerhouse spectrum, their individuality emblazoned by their long *élevage* in barrel, carried out in the name of longevity. Barrel aging is so important to their wines that the Guigals built their own cooperage at Château d’Ampuis in 2003 to have full control over the entire barrel-making process.

“Our vision for long *élevage* is what we believe gives our wines the ability to age for many decades—but it also means they need a lot of time before they are ready to drink,” says Philippe. While many producers have evolved their winemaking to craft wines that are more accessible upon release, Guigal has never wavered. “New oak is not something we seek out, but what we feel works with the balance of our wine.”

This oak signature melds into the framework of the wine with time in bottle, becoming less pronounced. La Landonne, which spends three and a half years in new oak, can require more than a decade in bottle to reveal its extraordinary potential. Guigal’s top cuvées are not for the impatient collector.

What was once a modern approach now places Guigal firmly in the traditionalist camp. In many fine wine regions, there is a shift away from excessive new oak, which detractors feel obscures the imprint of *terroir*. “It’s true that some people find the oak

intrusive, but I do think they manage to preserve the character of the place,” says Patrick Will, vice president at Vintus, who has known the Guigal family for decades. “Marcel is very reflective and thoughtful about the use of oak. It’s important for him that oak not get in the way of origin—Côte-Rôtie should taste like Côte-Rôtie. As they age, you see how the *élevage* actually elevates the character of the wine.”

Regardless of one’s palate, it’s impossible to deny the rare beauty of an aged La La. Philippe opens a bottle of the 1978 La Landonne, its first vintage, which now has spent four and a half decades in bottle, for the family’s mid-day meal. Not exactly a lunch wine, it somehow pairs perfectly with his mother’s black truffle scrambled eggs and *cervelas*, a smoked sausage unique to Lyon. “What I love about this wine is that it’s not over yet,” Philippe observes. “There is still so much life and freshness; the wine continues.”

**T**HAT PHILIPPE should be so immune to succumbing to the whims of winemaking fashion surprises no one who knows him—his chief hobbies outside of work are competitive ballroom dancing and antiques restoration. Still, when he joined the family business in 1997, having studied biochemistry at University of Lyon and enology in Burgundy, followed by a masters degree where he traveled the world for two years making wine in 17 countries, he returned with a desire to mix things up in the cellar. “I came back with a lot of new ideas,” he shares. “But over time I learned that what was done here was very solid.”

Marcel encouraged Philippe’s experimentation. Introduce concrete tanks in place of stainless steel? Sure, try it, son. Why aren’t we doing *délestage* (the rack-and-return process of draining red wine from the skins and pumping it back to soften tannins and extract flavor)? I don’t think it’s the best for Syrah, Marcel would say, but invited Philippe to see for himself through trial. “Each time I would return and report to my dad that he was right, the way he had long been working was better for these wines.”


There is a remarkable closeness between father and son. “We are

extremely different but we are extremely close—and we have the same vision for the wines. Our palates are totally aligned, we don’t even need to speak when we taste together,” Philippe describes. He

## GUIGAL IN CÔTE-RÔTIE



### CÔTE BLONDE VS. CÔTE BRUNE

Côte-Rôtie’s historic center is famously divided into two sides, **Côte Blonde** in the south and **Côte Brune** in the north, which yield very different styles of Syrah. Expect more elegance, delicacy and silkiness in wines from granite and gneiss soils in Blonde (often with the addition of Viognier), while the iron-rich, schist vineyards in Brune give brawnier, fuller-bodied and more muscular reds. Legend has it that these two adjacent hillsides were named by the 16th-century owner of Château d’Ampuis, who had two daughters, one blond and one brunette. Guigal created its “Brune et Blonde” cuvée with an aim to harness the best of both *terroirs* in a single blend.

grew up in the winery, as a young child following his grandfather from barrel to barrel in the family's serpentine cellar under Ampuis, pipette in hand. When he got older, he joined his father and grandfather in the cellar for their 90-minute tasting each day.

In the main office connected to the family home, there is a triangular desk with one corner for Marcel, one for his wife, Bernadette, (she joined the business when they married in 1973) and one for Philippe. He met his wife, Eve, in Corsica where she was born and raised, and she has become a commanding presence at the estate, juggling everything from French sales to marketing to winery tours. With 64 vintages under his belt, Marcel still proudly beats everyone to the office, seated at his desk by 5 a.m. every day.

**WHILE THE GUIGALS' TOP CUVÉES** give them prestige status, it's their success with Côtes du Rhône which has made the business a powerhouse. "Côtes du Rhône is 50% of what we do—5 million bottles in most years," says Philippe. "I truly love working on the Côtes du Rhône, there is so much fantastic opportunity and the challenge is keeping the quality high with volume. Consistency is everything for us."

Every year, they audition around 150 different growers across the

Southern Rhône, tasting an extraordinary amount of young wine samples for weeks on end in order to find the best sources to build their Côtes du Rhône, often selecting just 1.5% of what they taste, and getting the wines in house as fast as possible in order to control the *élevage*. “My grandfather had a strange habit, he would taste the Côtes du Rhône in old glass mustard jars. They are terrible glasses for tasting wine! When people asked why, he would say, ‘If a wine tastes good in a mustard glass, then it’s a really good wine.’”

In challenging years, they keep quality high by selecting only the best and simply making less wine—production fell by 80% in the difficult 2021 vintage, for example. “It’s mind-blowing how much work it is to build this wine from scratch,” says Vintus’ Will. By comparison, many négociants simply purchase large tanks of finished wines and bottle directly. “That they have the same standards here that they do for their top cuvées is testament to their integrity as producers, it’s emblematic of their whole approach,” says Will. In 2018 they hired the immensely talented Jacques Desvernois, formerly of Jaboulet, as head winemaker.

Quality hinges on access to the best growers, relationships they have spent decades building. “The Guigals have great respect for their sources and always paid them well,” explains Ek. “Most other companies would work on credit with long terms for paying the growers, but the Guigals pay when they purchase the wine, which is extremely unusual.”

**AFTER YEARS OF HUNTING** for the ideal property in the Southern Rhône, the Guigals finally found their foothold with the 2017 purchase of the historic yet under-achieving Château Nalys in Châteauneuf-du-Pape. Ralph Garcin was installed to craft the wines, which already shine brightly, and a massive construction project is currently underway to transform the winery into an architectural showpiece. Next, they snatched

up another Southern Rhône gem with the purchase of Château d’Aqueria with holdings in the *crus* of Tavel and Lirac. “I am very happy that the Guigal family has landed in Châteauneuf and Lirac,” says Pierre Fabre, the fourth generation to helm Châteauneuf’s Château Mont-Redon. “They have an immense sense of work and effort and they will be a steam engine for these appellations, especially

Lirac which is clearly underrated.”

They are expanding in the opposite direction as well, pioneering cooler vineyard sites in St.-Cyr-sur-le Rhône north of Ampuis, which was long considered above the limit where Syrah could sufficiently ripen. “Two decades ago you could not ripen grapes here, but with the warming climate, which we all see, it’s impossible to work the same way as the past, we need to be thinking of the best sites for the future,” Philippe says.

Like his father and grandfather, Philippe seems unable to resist the siren call of the next great vineyard. He’s also motivated, he admits, by an ever-so-slight chip on his shoulder. “We are in a dynamic region but I’m convinced we still have a lot of things to prove. People speak of Bordeaux and Burgundy with a reverence you don’t hear about when they speak of the Rhône. Rhône doesn’t have the same magic—not yet.”

All the ingredients are there, he believes, with icon wines from Condrieu, Côte-Rôtie, Châteauneuf and Hermitage. “And we have great Côtes du Rhône at affordable prices—this is something that is disappearing in Burgundy.”

Compared to top Burgundy, of course, even the La La wines are affordable luxuries. Elite wines from more revered regions are often purchased for investment or for status, rather than pure enjoyment in the glass. Wine lovers seek out Guigal wines to collect and to drink foremost because they are delicious and reflect the soul of a region and an incredibly passionate family. The world is a better place for wines like this. □

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# The RHÔNE COOLS OFF

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There are bright spots to be found amid the disappointments of the cold, challenging 2021 vintage

In cooler vintages, many winemakers deploy the term “classic” to describe their results, harkening back to an earlier era before climate change, when wines were leaner, racier and less ripe.

For the Rhône Valley wines now hitting the U.S. market from the 2021 vintage—one of the most excruciatingly difficult years in recent memory—that buzzword is in regular rotation. After a string of warm vintages, the 2021 growing season was unusually cold and wet across much of France. Growers were beset by devastating frosts, a cold summer and mildew-inducing rains at harvesttime. Yields were drastically reduced

throughout the region, while alcohol levels were also down—by 1% on average.

It’s a polarizing vintage, with some vintners finding bright spots amid the challenges. “The wines are more naturally balanced than in a warm year,” says Rodolphe de Pins of Château de Montfaucon in the Southern Rhône’s Lirac appellation. “Even if the wines don’t taste as intense when they’re young, they’ll evolve well long term.” Others offer more complicated assessments: “2021 was an empty vintage—low yields, low tannin, low acidity,” says Mounir Saouma of Rotem & Mounir Saouma in Châteauneuf-du-Pape. “Still, I like years like 2021 that are full

of energy, compared to 2020, which had too much of everything.”

Having reviewed nearly 650 wines in blind tastings at our New York office since my previous report (“The Rhône Faces the Heat,” Jan. 31 - Feb. 28, 2023), I found an incredibly wide qualitative range among the 2021s compared with other recent vintages. In addition, the year played out very differently for Northern Rhône producers than for their colleagues in the south. (Note: Many top producers have yet to release their 2021s, so their wines were not officially reviewed for this report.)

The gap between producers and *terroirs* is more apparent in years such as 2021, which makes this a vintage to approach with a little more discernment than usual. Although decidedly a step down from the excellent 2020 and 2019 vintages, the 2021 harvest still delivers a number of very good wines. In some of the best examples, the vintage offers an opportunity to see a different side to the Rhône, particularly in the south, where consumers have grown accustomed to opulent ripeness and warmth in the glass.

It’s worth keeping in mind that what may seem like a lean vintage reflects a big shift in our perception, insists Marc Perrin of Château de Beaucastel in Châteauneuf-du-Pape. “I like to remind people that 2021 was warmer than 1978, and that was considered a warm year in the 1970s!”

## THE NORTHERN RHÔNE

The past decade of warmer vintages has allowed Syrah to showcase its more voluptuous side, making the struggle to ripen grapes seem like a thing of the past. Then came 2021.

Trouble began in early April with one of the worst frosts in the past century, with many growers recording their lowest temperatures since 1938. “We lost 80% of our grapes in Condrieu and 30% of all our Syrah in Côte-Rôtie to frost,” reports Georges Vernay winemaker Emma Amsellem. Côte-Rôtie’s high-elevation vineyards were severely impacted, with many sites completely decimated. Domaine Rostaing lost half its crop.

Persistent rain followed, which led to mildew and rot—and thinner-skinned, more vulnerable grapes. A cold summer and fall meant ripening was delayed significantly, leading growers to pick an average of two weeks later than usual. Many were still forced to chaptalize (the winemaking practice of adding sugar to fermenting grapes to amp up alcohol and texture).

Stéphane Ogier, who has emerged as one of most talented winemakers in the Northern Rhône, chose not to produce any of his single-vineyard cuvées, a series of wines highlighting the specificity of Côte-Rôtie’s diverse *lieux-dits*. Instead, he blended that fruit into lesser wines—a decision many producers made. “I needed the remaining fruit from those top sites to bring richness to my regional Mon Village 2021 blend, which, as a result, is quite good.” (Stay tuned for that wine’s upcoming release.)

Extensive sorting to eliminate diseased grapes meant more work for already exhausted growers. “It was necessary to sort in the vineyards and in the winery—there was so much rot,” says Loïc Jamet, who works with his father, Jean-Paul, at iconic Côte-Rôtie estate Domaine Jamet. “I like the spirit of the 2021 vintage—it reminds me of what the essence of Côte-Rôtie is, with soft tannins, elegance and freshness. For sure, it’s less impressive than other years yet still

better than 2008 and 2014. But I don't want to do it again."

Like many top producers in the Northern Rhône, Jamet has yet to release its 2021 wines. A tasting of the vintage at the domaine in November 2023 revealed the beautiful combination of finesse, purity and texture that makes Jamet one of the most revered names in the Rhône. Loïc is joined by his sister, Fanny, and brother, Dorian, and it's clear the third generation is committed to staying true to the Jamet style, employing whole-cluster fermentation, with very little new oak, and bottling the wines unfiltered.

High up on a plateau in the heart of the Côte-Rôtie hills, the winery offers views of snowcapped Mont Blanc and the Alps on a clear day. Most of Jamet's holdings are in the Côte Brune side of Côte-Rôtie, which was one of the only places to suffer no frost damage in 2021, Jamet says. Dark schist soils result in a structured, dark fruit style of Syrah, one that ages phenomenally well. Jamet's flagship 2020 Côte-Rôtie (96 points, \$210) is a star of this report.

**O**verwhelmingly, I find that the 2021 Northern Rhône reds showcase a leaner profile. The best are high-toned and aromatic, lighter-bodied and quite elegant, dominated by red fruit rather than black, with a refined tannin profile and racy acidity. The less successful versions are astringent, tart and diluted.

Dilution, in fact, is the vintage's biggest problem, according to Jean-Louis Chave, who represents the 16th generation to run his family's namesake domaine in Hermitage. "It was the first time for me to see such a vintage—there was so much rain," he says. "The problem isn't just lack of sugar or ripeness. The rain dilutes acidity and tannins, too, so the wine is just floating." He adds that this



was a particular issue for the flatter vineyard sites in Crozes-Hermitage. "The hills made all the difference, where rain can run off and, of course, there are older vines that are more resilient."

This explains the success of Hermitage, arguably the most elite hill in the Rhône Valley, whose granite slopes escaped frost damage while shedding excess water. "Hermitage was very strong in 2021—it is still the hill of Hermitage," says Chave. "In the end, it's not about people but the place." As with most Hermitage producers, he has not yet released his 2021s, but tasting the vintage with Chave in his cellar proved his point—the wines show impressive depth and concentration, if a somewhat racier edge. Chave believes the vintage offers more of an easy-drinking style, perhaps better suited for earlier consumption, but he also says the wines may surprise us in their ability to age: "We have had a few of these vintages, like 1981, which age well in a more Pinot Noir way."

At Delas, based in Tain-l'Hermitage, winemaker Jacques Grange holds the opinion that most of 2021's harvest was best suited to "a vinification process aimed at producing fresh, fruity wines that should be enjoyed young." But, like Chave, he's also curious about longevity from some top sites, believing that the higher acid levels

in 2021, which he describes as close to “pre-climate change vintages,” suggest “an interesting aging potential.”

Delas won't be releasing any single-vineyard cuvées in 2021. However, Grange reports that the domaine's hillside vineyards in Hermitage, St.-Joseph and Cornas “coped particularly well with the difficulties of the vintage,” and growers who picked late were rewarded with high quality wines. “Patience was the order of the day at harvesttime—the latest harvests brought out the best wines,” he says. “The Hermitage Les Bessards, like the St.-Joseph Ste.-Epine, were only brought into the winery in the very last days of September.”

Picking late can be dangerous and expensive, as producers risk losing more grapes to rot, but it made all the difference for growers in Cornas in 2021. “It was a year to pick as late as possible, despite

the risks,” says Lionel Fraisse, winemaker and co-owner of Alain Voge, one of the appellation's finest estates. Cornas was hit hard by frost in its upper vineyards, but lower-altitude sites and flatlands had it worse, with some vineyards losing everything.

“The *lieu-dit* of St.-Pierre, the highest position in the appellation, was the most adapted to this vintage,” Fraisse says. “Yields are always low, so the site could achieve some concentration.” Indeed, the Alain Voge Cornas Chapelle St. Pierre 2021 (95, \$125) is the highest-scoring Northern Rhône red from the 2021 vintage in this report.

One noteworthy silver lining for the vintage is the quality of the year's white wines. “The 2021 vintage offers a very interesting balance both analytically and aromatically,” explains Vernay's Amsellem. In the famed white wine appellation of Condrieu, the Viognier grape can easily veer into cloying, unctuous territory, yet the 2021s

avoid these pitfalls entirely. Precise and vibrant, they offer, in Amsellem's words, “a beautiful bouquet of white flower, citrus and stone fruit—reminiscent of the 1980s and 1990s in freshness and moderate alcohol.” She notes that “the balance of the vintage also promises good aging potential.”

In the rest of the Northern Rhône, whites are based on Marsanne and Roussanne, which can also become blowsy and unbalanced in very ripe years. “The fresh, rainy, late vintages bring a beautiful tension to Marsanne grapes—they show a Burgundy, flinty nose,” says Fraisse, who has invested heavily in St.-Péray, a small white wine appellation near Cornas. Although Fraisse lost half his crop to frost in 2021, his two cuvées, the St.-Péray Fleur de Crussol (94, \$70) and St.-Péray Harmonie (92, \$40), showcase that profile.

Limestone soils and high-altitude *terroir* have both contributed to the exciting rediscovery of St.-Péray as a premier appellation for whites.

Hermitage whites also benefited from additional acidity, says Chave. “This was a vintage for whites—they show terrific mineral intensity, whereas in some years they can be too heavy,” he adds. “The 2021s will age well.” Michel Chapoutier, too, praises the classicism of the year’s whites, believing that in cooler vintages the *terroir* has a better ability to express itself. While both Chave and Chapoutier are waiting until next year to release their 2021s, they are currently selling their 2020 whites, which are, unsurprisingly, some of the most exceptional wines in this report.

For a particularly racy version, seek out the Hermitage White Le Chevalier de Sterimberg from Paul Jaboulet Aîné. Caroline Frey, who has directed winemaking there since her family purchased the Jaboulet estate and vineyards in 2006, has decided to create a separate brand for the two top Hermitage cuvées—Le Chevalier de Sterimberg and its red counterpart, La Chapelle—starting with the 2021 vintage. Going forward, the wines will be labeled under the name Domaine de la Chapelle to distinguish them from the rest of the Jaboulet lineup.

Frey’s style is one of restraint and elegance, and the taut, mineral-driven Sterimberg (93, \$108), aged in concrete, offers a much crisper style of Hermitage blanc, even in warm years. “I pick earlier, reduce the percentage of new oak and try to prevent oxidation,” Frey says.

The Frey family is building a new winery at the base of Hermitage dedicated to the production of the two cuvées. “Our new chapter is to more completely tell the story and experience of this *terroir*.”

## THE SOUTHERN RHÔNE

Fans of richer, more opulent styles from the Southern Rhône should take note: 2021 is not the year for you. But for those eager for a break from the run of powerful, concentrated, drought-influenced vintages that ran from 2016 through 2020, there is a lot to discover this time around.

“There is a freshness and structure to the vintage—a sharpness to the wines,” says Isabel Ferrando of the 2021s from her namesake domaine. Her Châteauneuf-du-Pape St.-Prefert 2021 (94, \$115) shows a beautiful vibrancy, while her Colombis 2021 (95, \$210), a top cuvée from 100% Grenache sourced from 80-year-old vines and whole-cluster fermented, is plush and alluring. Neither lacks for generosity or power.

“Many people thought from the start that this vintage would be without complexity, without concentration—that’s wrong,” says fourth-generation vintner Véronique Maret of Domaine de la Charbonnière, who has overseen a notable rise in quality since taking the reins in 2012. “We have ripe, full-bodied wines that show a

beautiful elegance. They are softer, more approachable early on, but with a great acidity that will help them age.” Whereas Maret lost much of her crop to frost in Vacqueyras and Côtes du Rhône, most of her fruit in Châteauneuf was unharmed. In fact, Châteauneuf overall was spared much of the devastating frosts and excessive rot of surrounding areas (thanks to the famously powerful mistral wind), only down 25% in volume.

“The vintage is more Burgundy style—with freshness, polished tannins and an herbal character,” says Vincent Maurel of Clos St.-Jean. Yet those who prefer Châteauneuf to Burgundy need not fear, since the 2021 Clos St.-Jean cuvées offer all of the decadence and sunny Mediterranean character that have made them favorites of wine fans.

Older vines were a big advantage in 2021, says Maurel. His La Combe des Fous cuvée (95, \$140), made from 60-year-old vines and gently extracted in the cellar, is a standout. Another secret weapon was late-ripening varieties, particularly Mourvèdre, which makes up 40% of the blend in Clos St.-Jean’s Deus Ex Machina (96, \$140), one of the top-scoring wines of the 2021 vintage.

Others chose not to make their top cuvées in 2021. Pierre Fabre of Mont-Redon, for example, didn’t craft his Le Plateau cuvée, as he couldn’t reach the style he wanted to achieve. (A late-release bottling, the Le Plateau 2018 (94, \$163) is the current vintage on the market.) But Fabre is very happy with the elegance and balance in his other 2021 wines: “2021 is comparable to 2013 for freshness, but with the power of 2015. In the ’90s or ’80s, 2021

would be considered a great vintage, as we had no comparison possible with such vintages like 2019 or 2016.”

All of the vintners I spoke with agree that Châteauneuf-du-Pape blanc is a vintage highlight. “The whites are extraordinary, with excellent natural acidity and moderate alcohol,” says Fabre, whose 2021 Châteauneuf white received 93 points (\$53). Freshness and acidity can be in short supply in warm years, and white varieties benefited from the added energy. Isabel Ferrando’s old-vine Clairette (95, \$420); Château de Beaucastel’s fascinating Vieilles Vignes (94, \$191), made from 100% Roussanne; and Château La Nerthe’s exuberant Clos de Beauvenir (93, \$136), a Roussanne-based blend, are top 2021 bottles worth seeking out.

Although far better known for its reds, Domaine de Marcoux also crafts a stunning Châteauneuf white, whose 2021 bottling is among

# Spain's Toro

## WINES WITH HISTORY AND PERSONALITY

In the annals of history, there is a record of Christopher Columbus carrying the wines of Toro on his voyage to the New World, making these opulent Spanish wines the first from Europe to reach the Americas.

From pre-Roman settlements along the Duero River in western Spain to the tables of royal courts through the centuries, the wines of Toro have impressed the masses and critics alike.

“Much of Toro’s prestige is due to our indigenous grapes, old vines and our extraordinary weather,” says Felipe Nalda, president of the Consejo Regulador de la Denominación de Origen Toro. “But it is the rustic beauty of the Tinta de Toro grape and the pedoclimatic qualities of each vineyard site that have made Toro wines an exciting choice for anyone who enjoys a beautiful glass of wine with a meal.”

### **TORO'S HISTORY**

Toro’s reputation for producing excellent wines began with the Romans, who were the original champions of winegrowing throughout western

Spain in modern-day Castilla y León and continued the tradition through the centuries.

Toro is one of the oldest recognized wine regions in Spain. Throughout history, these exhilarating wines have found their way to the tables of Flanders and the courts of Spanish kings, among others.

Following the devastating phylloxera epidemic in the 19th century, during which the wines from Toro were widely exported to satisfy shortages throughout Europe, the region underwent a dramatic transformation.

The bold black Tinta de Toro grape lead the charge. Many of these ungrafted vines still produce some of Toro’s best wines. More than 2,000 of the 5,438 hectares registered under vine are more than 35 years old, qualifying them as old vineyards.

In 1932, Toro was acknowledged as a Denominación de Origen (DO) for the first time, making it one of the oldest recognized wine regions in Spain, along with Jerez and Rioja. In 1987, Toro received its official certification as one of Spain’s finest DOs.

## TORO'S SOILS

The character of Toro wines is the result of its dynamic location on the western Iberian Peninsula, the semiarid continental climate with Atlantic influences, and a pastiche of soils found throughout the region.

The Duero River winds through this fertile territory, which boasts eight unique soil compositions with excellent drainage and varying concentrations of sand, gravel, boulders, sandstone, clay, limestone, silt and detritic loam—each of which contributes to the wealth of colors and flavors in Toro wines.

Vineyards are planted between 620 m to 870 m amsl. At this elevation, wines have great balance and ripeness. Every vineyard site adds a distinctive signature to wines made with Tinta de Toro.

## TORO'S GRAPES

In 1990, the government of Castilla y León embarked on a selection and cloning initiative to save the region's native varieties.

There are several grape varieties permitted in the Toro DO, but the star of the region is the Tinta de Toro.

**Tinta de Toro** delivers deep color, powerful aromas and intense flavors with significant balance and ripe tannins. Nearly half of all vineyards in Toro are planted with ungrafted indigenous clones.

**Garnacha Tinta** is exalted for its inviting aromas and the supple qualities it brings to blends.

**Verdejo** is a light white wine known for its pleasant fruit profile.

**Malvasia-Castellana** is delicate and fruity. The grapes often spend some time macerating.

**Albillo Real** produces fresh and elegant wines with an aromatic profile of stone fruits and white flowers.

**Moscatel de Grano Menudo** is a highly aromatic white wine with a floral profile, fragrances of dried fruit, a high alcohol content and residual sugar.

## TORO'S WINES

There is a wide range of outstanding white, rosé and red wines being produced by more than 60 wineries working under rigorous quality standards for Toro's indigenous varieties.

Tinta de Toro is the most popular black grape in the region, representing 95% of red wines in every style, including youthful Joven and Joven Roble wines, vibrant Crianzas, and reserva and gran reserva wines.

"Our commitment to quality considers the entire process, with specific rules that range from the planting of a vineyard and cultural practices to the sale of every bottle carrying the Toro name," says Nalda.



## WHERE IS TORO?

The Toro DO is located southeast of the province of Zamora and southwest of the province of Valladolid, in western Castilla y León.

The hillside town of Toro has innumerable treasures: centuries-old wineries, historic palaces, the magnificent Collegiate Church of Santa María la Mayor and the Alcázar de Toro—a castle constructed in the 13th century with views of the Duero River.



At famed Châteauneuf-du-Pape domaine Clos St.-Jean, the key to success in 2021 involved a reliance on older vines as well as later-ripening varieties such as Mourvèdre.

*Wine Spectator's* Top 100 Wines of 2023. “The cooler summer was honestly better for the vines,” says Sophie Armenier, who runs her family’s winery, now joined by her son, Vincent Estevenin. “Because of that we were able to make wines with more freshness and a bit less alcohol than these last vintages.”

Outside of Châteauneuf, quality was a mixed bag, with some outstanding wines and others lacking ripeness or depth. In Vacqueyras, more than 75% of the vineyards suffered frost damage, while heavy September rains created serious mildew problems. “Growers who machine-harvest weren’t able to sort in the vines, so they brought a lot of mold into the winery and ended up with poor-quality wines. Hand-picking was very important in 2021,” observes de Pins of Montfaucon. “Difficult vintages increase the gap between vigneron.”

Gigondas was impacted in lower-lying vineyards by record-breaking April frosts, but higher-elevation sites in the hillsides of the Dentelles de Montmirail mountains fared better. Those who picked later made the best wines. At Pierre Amadiou, Jean-Marie Amadiou reports that they didn’t pick even the white varieties until Oct. 8. “This brings us back to the ripening dates of the 1990s!” he says. “By waiting, we were able to achieve good ripeness, along with salinity and fine-grained tannins.” Amadiou’s 2021 Domaine Grand Romane (93, \$45) is a sleek, voluptuous case in point.

In tasting through the vintage, it’s evident which producers rolled the dice and waited to pick later versus those who harvested early. “I’ve never taken this much risk,” says Julien Bréchet of Domaine des Bosquets. Along with Louis Barruol of neighboring

Château de St.-Cosme, Bréchet was among the last in Gigondas to pick. “The signature of the *terroir* is all in the skins—it was critical for me to wait until full ripening, but it was really stressful.”

*Terroir* mapping is an obsession for Bréchet, who spent a decade exploring the various sites across his 64 acres, many of which he bottles as single-vineyard wines. In 2019, he decided to make a micro-cuvée of small selections from his very top sites. Called Le Regard Loin, the 2021 (95 points) shows the vintage at its most powerful and lush—a sign that his late-picking gamble paid off.

As usual, Louis Barruol’s Château de St.-Cosme cuvées were some of the best of the vintage. His single-site wines—Le Poste, Le Claux, Hominis Fides—reveal the unmatched excellence of ancient vines in limestone soils. “The top sites can give concentration even in difficult years,” Barruol says. “They taste great upon release, and they also age well—this was even true in my father’s era. This is St.-Cosme.”

The beauty of Gigondas is in the range of styles and expressions one can achieve from its diverse soils and elevations. For stylistic contrast, Benjamin Gras at Domaine Santa Duc continues to evolve the house style toward a more restrained, mineral-driven profile. A vintage like 2021 accentuates the differences in producers’ philosophies, he says: “It’s a difficult vintage that is best described as a *millésime de vigneron*,’ as the choices we make shape the future of the wine.” He decided to ferment his 2021s 100% whole cluster, and the wines offer a peppery, savory delicacy. “It’s totally different from 2020 but just as interesting, in my opinion.”

As with any vintage, beauty is in the eye of the beholder. For wine drinkers eager to get back to the string of riper, more homogeneously high quality vintages, fear not: 2022 and 2023 offer a return to the Rhône’s new normal.

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
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# THE ASCENT OF IRISH WHISKEY

LONGER AGING AND  
NEW INNOVATIONS  
ARE RAISING THE  
PRESTIGE OF THIS  
CLASSIC SPIRIT

One of the happy consequences of the modern restoration of the Irish whiskey industry has been the emergence of luxury Irish whiskeys. Ireland is now dotted with scores of new distilleries, where distillers are diligently laying down spirit in parts of the island where whiskey hasn't been made for over 100 years. Well, not legally anyway. While the choice of young Irish whiskeys keeps expanding, long-established distilleries such as Bushmills and Midleton are in the lucky position of having casks of Irish whiskey that have been maturing in the warehouse for two or three decades. As Irish whiskey's popularity keeps growing, distillers are dipping into this pot of gold to produce some incredible tasting superpremium pours. With bottles changing hands at auction for thousands of dollars, collecting rare Irish bottles is also becoming increasingly popular. When it comes to elevating your Irish whiskey game, there are three strategies to consider: Drink better, buy discontinued or antique bottles or build a collection of the very best the island has to offer.

## DRINK BETTER IRISH WHISKEYS

Starting out, distillers at new distilleries face a choice of either bottling their own young whiskeys, aged for a minimum of three years, or bottling sourced mature whiskeys in order to put a credible age statement on the label

to garner attention. Powerscourt Distillery opened in late 2018 near Dublin and began to bottle its own Fercullen single malt whiskey in 2023 yet, incongruously, they also offer a Fercullen 21 year old as an annual release. This sourced whiskey acquired from another distillery allows Powerscourt fans to trade up to a fine pour that the distillery's own production couldn't possibly supply until 2040. Each year, cask strength expressions of The Irishman and Writers' Tears whiskeys are released in limited quantities and make an excellent next rung on the ladder for imbibers looking to up their Irish whiskey game. Both blend single malt and single pot still Irish whiskeys in different proportions, but without the inclusion of cheaper grain whiskey, a style dubbed "the Champagne of Irish whiskey." Even The Last Drop Distillers, purveyors of remarkable parcels of rare liquids, released their first Irish whiskey in 2023, a signature creation by J.J. Corry founder Louise McGuane, who

married and finished a 32 year old single malt Irish whiskey for their discerning clientele.

Ireland may have a young, reinvigorated industry, but it is not short of mature whiskeys either, offering the perfect taste of Ireland's distinctive whiskey styles. On the north coast of Northern Ireland, close to the Giant's Causeway UNESCO World Heritage Site, Bushmills Distillery promotes itself as the oldest licensed whiskey distillery, with records going back to 1608. While the older parts of the distillery actually date from the late 19th and early 20th

centuries—a devastating fire raised the 18th century buildings to the ground in 1885—current owner Proximo Spirits has doubled the site’s capacity by opening the state-of-the-art Causeway Distillery in 2023. Bushmills makes triple-distilled single malt Irish whiskeys, initially matured in Bourbon and oloroso Sherry casks, and for the past two decades, Bushmills 21 year old has been its oldest expression, which is finished in Madeira casks for two years. Master distiller Alex Thomas added a beautiful 25 year old expression in 2023, which underwent a secondary maturation in first-fill ruby Port pipes for up to 21 years, imbuing the whiskey with opulent dark berry and chocolate flavors. Above that, Bushmills 30 year old is the result of a 16 year secondary maturation in Pedro Ximénez casks and has indulgent notes of raisin, fig, orange peel, and vanilla. Exclusive to the U.S., the Bushmills Rare Cask Series

is an annual limited edition selected by the master blender, with the initial releases aged for 28 years or more.

In 2018 in Dublin, Jack and Stephen Teeling bottled their first Teeling Distillery single pot still whiskey, a three year old example of Ireland’s distinctive style of whiskey predominantly made from malted and unmalted barley. The Teeling family, however, still owned stocks of mature Irish whiskey made at Cooley Distillery, which their father, John Teeling, had founded in 1987. In 2011 he sold the distillery in a \$95 million deal with Beam Inc.

Teeling Distillery has released several double-distilled single malt Irish whiskeys aged over 30 years made at Cooley under their Teeling Vintage Reserve Collection line. Teeling master distiller Alex Chasko also debuted a 32 year old Purple Muscat Cask Finish in their new Teeling Very Rare Casks Collection in 2022, adding a

33 year old Pineau des Charentes Finish expression in 2023. “My family have been involved in making whiskey for generations,” said Stephen Teeling, sales and marketing director. “I am incredibly proud as a family to have some of the finest and rarest Irish single malts in our warehouses, enabling us to create special opportunities for people to own a piece of Irish whiskey history.”

## THE VERY BEST TO DRINK OR KEEP

**J**ameson Irish whiskey, Ireland’s biggest-selling whiskey, is made at Midleton Distillery in County Cork, which is unsurprisingly Ireland’s largest distillery. This is also where Midleton Very Rare is made, a premium blend of single pot still and grain whiskeys positioned as the pinnacle of Irish whiskey. The master distiller has released this as an annual vintage every year since 1984.

While they have stuck within the parameters of a recognizable flavor profile, framed by maturation in Bourbon casks, each year’s Midleton Very Rare vintage still has its own personality and character. Current master distiller Kevin O’Gorman is only the third person to have the honor of seeing his signature on the label over the past 40 years, and his Midleton Very Rare Vintage 2024 will be one of the most anticipated releases of the spring. Collecting vintages of Midleton Very Rare became quite a craze as online whiskey auction platforms took off in Ireland, enabling collectors to secure the missing vintages they needed to complete a full set. Such is the competition that collectors are willing to pay tens of thousands of dollars to acquire their quarry. In 2023, Irish Distillers launched a new annual series named Midleton Very Rare Forêt de Tronçais, a blend of single pot still and grain whiskeys distilled in the 1980s–2000s, finished in French casks made of new Tronçais oak, renowned in the Cognac and wine industries for its fine grain and its ability to impart subtle and delicate flavors.

## LIQUID HISTORY

**I**rish whiskey collecting is less common than collecting Scotch or Japanese whisky, but that aspect makes it attractive to astute collectors looking to stay ahead of the curve. Auction houses, such

as Irish Whiskey Auctions, are wonderful sources of discontinued favorites like Jameson Rarest Vintage Reserve 2007 or antique bottlings of Powers Gold Label and John Jameson & Son 3 Star distilled in Dublin at the John’s Lane Distillery and Bow Street Distillery respectively, both of which closed in the early 1970s. The

Midleton Distillery opened in the mid-1970s, replacing the adjacent old distillery that is now part of a major visitor attraction. Until Irish Distillers Ltd. launched Midleton Very Rare Silent Distillery Chapter One in 2020, bottlings from the Old Midleton Distillery were only found occasionally at auction. The Silent Distillery series encompasses Ireland’s oldest whiskeys, released in tiny quantities, starting with a 45 year old whiskey and continuing with a whiskey aged another year older each year. The series will culminate with a 50 year old released in 2025 to coincide with the 200th anniversary of the Old Midleton Distillery. When bottles from this series have gone under the hammer, they have commanded the highest auction prices ever seen for Irish whiskey.

Taking your Irish whiskey game to the next level is worth investing your time for the rewarding flavor experiences it can bring to your palate. Your passion may even lead you to take ownership of some of the most precious liquids in Irish whiskey history.

# WASHINGTON ABIDES

Washington weathered the significant challenges of the 2020 vintage, including its haze of wildfires, better than its fellow West Coast states. Whether you chalk that up to experience, tenacity or even a bit of luck, the results are indisputable: an array of delicious wines currently available on the market. In no small part, that's because of the excellent vintages that bookend 2020, the superb 2019s that preceded it and the promising 2021s that followed.

This conclusion is based on my recent visit to the Evergreen State as well as my reviews of nearly 325 wines in blind tastings at our Napa office since my previous report ("On Solid Ground," March 31, 2023). Last year, I gave the 2020 vintage a preliminary rating of 88–91 points on *Wine Spectator's* 100-point scale, which reflected caution over the impact of wildfire smoke. There was little evidence of smoke taint in my recent tastings—and actual proof would require lab tests—but too many of the 2020s are distinctly savory, with muscular frames, yet seem hollow in the midpalate and taut on the finish. They simply lack Washington's typical structure and generosity.

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*Winemakers navigate the challenging 2020 vintage and find promise in 2021*

Whether that's a symptom of the vintage itself or of the wines being overly processed to remove any possible sign of taint is difficult to say. What's clear, however, is that the top players made wines that, though still outstanding, are generally lower in quality than their 2018 and 2019 counterparts. It's this combination of factors that led me to rate the 2020 vintage at 90 points overall. The 2021 vintage, which is just entering the market, had some headaches of its own and earns a preliminary rating of 90–93 points.

Leading this year's releases is the compelling Quilceda Creek Cabernet Sauvignon Columbia Valley 2020 (96 points, \$250), which is rich, polished and impeccably structured. Just a step behind come two classic reds from winemaker Chris Figgins, the Figgins Walla Walla Valley 2020 (95, \$95), a wine of dimension and detail that's framed by dynamic structure, and the Leonetti Reserve Walla Walla Valley 2020 (\$95, \$160), which is powerfully built yet retains finesse and polish, with robust blackberry and red currant flavors laced with clove.

After skipping the 2020 vintage, Betz came roaring back with its 2021s, crafted by winemaker Louis Skinner. The Bésolil Olsen Vineyard Yakima Valley 2021 (94, \$52), a Rhône-style red blend, is graceful and expressive, with blueberry and cherry flavors, while the Syrah Walla Walla Valley Domaine de Pierres Ancient Stones Vineyard 2021 (94, \$68) is vibrant and alluring, with raspberry, *garrigue* and savory cracked pepper tones.

Vigneron Christophe Baron and his righthand Elizabeth Bourcier



had a good year as well, turning out three 94-point Horsepower Syrahs from 2020. The expressive Walla Walla Valley The Tribe Vineyard 2020 (\$133) boasts bold yet elegant blueberry, crushed stone and black olive flavors, while the Walla Walla Valley High Contrast Vineyard (\$133) is vibrant and keenly structured, with huckleberry, *garrigue* and bacon fat notes, and the Syrah Walla Walla Valley Sur Echalas Vineyard (\$133) is polished and sleek, building tension and richness.



DeLille winemaker Jason Gronski produced a range of outstanding reds and whites this year across multiple vintages, including 2020, 2021 and 2022.



Chris Gorman's 2021 bottling of The Evil Twin sources Red Mountain Syrah and Cabernet to showcase the impressive potential of the vintage.

A handful of other winemakers achieved impressive results, yielding wines such as Chris Gorman's deeply structured Gorman Syrah-Cabernet Sauvignon Red Mountain The Evil Twin 2021 (94, \$75), Matt Reynvaan's polished Reynvaan Syrah Walla Walla Valley In The Rocks 2020 (94, \$100) and Trey Busch's elegant Sleight of Hand Syrah Columbia Valley Levitation Reserve 2021 (94, \$55). DeLille's Le Dessen Columbia Valley 2021 (93, \$45), crafted by winemaker Jason Gorski, is a graceful Rhône-style red offering supple raspberry and blueberry flavors.

While too many 2020 reds at the value level are hard and angular, there are high quality bargains to be found if you shop carefully.

Among white wines, two bottlings stand out: Barnard Griffin's fresh and snappy Chardonnay Columbia Valley 2021 (90, \$14), featuring tropical fruit and citrus flavors, and Luke's generous Chardonnay Ancient Lakes Of Columbia Valley 2022 (89, \$22), evoking green apple, lemon curd and spices.

As for reds, the Merlot-based 14 Hands Hot To Trot Smooth Red Blend Columbia Valley 2020 (87, \$12) is a fruit bomb, while Airfield's Merlot Yakima Valley 2021 (88, \$20) is polished and supple and Browne's Merlot Columbia Valley 2020 (90, \$26) is vibrant and zesty. Two outstanding Cabernet-based blends are also worth seeking out: Kirkland Signature's user-friendly Signature

Series Columbia Valley 2021 (90, \$17) is vibrant with notes of cherry, mocha and toasty spices, while Pendulum's elegant Columbia Valley 2021 (90, \$20) is sleek, with cherry and spice accents.

**A**lthough the 2020 vintage was warmer than the cool 2019 vintage, 2021 was a scorcher. In 2020, bloom came early in spring and wet, windy weather caused shatter, stunting the size of the future harvest. A series of heat spikes hit in late July and early August, and then as Labor Day approached and harvest was underway, wildfires in Oregon sent clouds of smoke toward Washington. The smoke remained high in the atmosphere, but it blanketed the state, stalling ripening for about 10 days.

Because of producers' concerns about smoke taint, West Coast labs were overwhelmed with grapes and juice samples to test. Winemakers were doing their own small-batch test trials. Wineries that did bottle 2020 reds often made hard decisions in the cellar. A significant amount of wine was eventually sold in bulk, which means production overall was down.

The 2021 season was the hottest on record, equaling or surpassing the sweltering 2015

vintage. Although Washington winemakers are now experienced at dealing with heat as the region's growing seasons get warmer, the challenges of 2021 were serious. The heat culminated at the end of June, when a heat dome descended on the Pacific Northwest and areas of the Columbia Valley sweated through four days of temperatures as high as 118° F.

Luckily, the grapes were still green and firm, since veraison was a few weeks away, so that limited the damage. Cabernet, however, was in a crucial period of development at that point, and up to 30% of the crop was lost.

“We didn't see a lot of sunburn or damage,” says winemaker Mark McNeilly, whose Mark Ryan Syrah Red Mountain Wild Eyed 2021 (92, \$50) is dark and brooding yet not heavy. “I like the 2021 vintage a lot. There's a lot of density and richness in the wines.” Reynvaan agrees that the 2021s almost made themselves. “You didn't have to do too much in the cellar,” he says. “It was all right there.”

My advice in the coming year is not to write off the 2020 Washington reds, but instead choose wisely among the available offerings. The 2019s are still abundant, so grab those while you await the arrival the 2021s, which will be worth your exploration.

# WASHINGTON STAR POWER: KYLE MACLACHLAN

The haze over Walla Walla Valley hangs thick in the air on an August afternoon as the dashboard thermometer approaches 107° F. As he drives along country roads, passing vineyards and fallow wheat fields, Kyle MacLachlan has one thing on his mind: coffee.

The irony of this is not lost on MacLachlan. Coffee was the favorite beverage of his iconic *Twin Peaks* character, Agent Dale Cooper, and after tasting wine for most of the day, MacLachlan is in need of a cup. For the record, he likes it black, just like Cooper. His other drink of choice, of course, is wine. For the actor—whose best-known work, covering both TV and film, also includes *Desperate Housewives*, *Portlandia*, *Sex and the City*, *Blue Velvet* and the original *Dune*—wine started as a hobby but grew into his own

Washington label, Pursued By Bear. MacLachlan takes the wine business as seriously as he does acting.

“I’ve seen these celebrity wines come and go, but Kyle is the real deal,” Napa Valley winemaker Doug Shafer says of his friend. “It’s not like he’s slapping his name on it, not just lending his name. He’s into it. He knows wine and loves wine.”

The wines MacLachlan makes prove the point. Pursued By Bear consistently receives outstanding scores of 90 points or higher on *Wine Spectator*’s 100-point scale, led by the winery’s flagship bottling, the Cabernet Sauvignon Columbia Valley, which debuted with the 2005 vintage. Bear Cub is a value-oriented Cabernet-Merlot blend, while Blushing Bear is a dry rosé made with Grenache and Mourvèdre from Walla Walla. There are two limited-production wines: Twin Bear Walla Walla Valley Cabernet Sauvignon and Twin Bear Columbia Valley Chardonnay.

MacLachlan’s signature on the back label is the only way consumers know he’s involved in Pursued By Bear. “If the wine can’t stand on its own, what’s the point of doing it?” he says. That comment explains a lot about how MacLachlan approaches wine and life. Napa vintner Ann Colgin, who has known him since 1998, puts it this way: “His bottlings are a true reflection of his theatrical background and

his desire to create something really good.”

For a celebrity vintner, MacLachlan is indeed hands on. Not only is he involved in selecting vineyards and oak barrels, as well as establishing his preferred style of wines, but also he regularly tastes and tweaks blends in partnership with winemakers Daniel Wampfler and Amy Alvarez-Wampfler.

Wampfler tells a recent story that speaks to MacLachlan’s devotion. After making a design change to their label, the two of them traveled to the printer in Portland to supervise the press check. “Kyle was looking through the magnifying glass, checking colors and making sure everything was perfect,” Wampfler says. “The printer said they had done a lot of celebrities’ projects, but he was the first to ever show up.” MacLachlan laughs, adding, “Well, being the mayor of Portland, it was important I was there”—a reference to his role as the zany mayor in the TV series *Portlandia*.

MacLachlan admits that he is meticulous, or, as he says with jest, anal retentive. “I think it’s important to get everything just right. You’re creating something personal, and you’re sharing it with people and want them to have a good experience, and that includes all the little bits and pieces that go into it, like the glass and labeling. Even the tasting room—I want them to feel like they’re in a friendly place that has a little bit of my personality, a little fun.”

The Pursued By Bear tasting room opened in 2023 in Walla Walla, just off Main Street, where more than a dozen other wineries pour for consumers. The wines are made a few miles away at Abeja Winery, where the Wampflers are also the winemakers. Indeed, MacLachlan’s tasting room is tongue in cheek: A 6-foot-tall bronze statue of a bear stands against a mural of misty pine trees, a *Twin Peaks* allusion that was both intentional and intentionally subtle.

“I knew I had to acknowledge what is perhaps the most iconic thing I’ve done,” MacLachlan says.

The story behind the bear is more intricate. “When we started, I said, ‘No, this is not going to be a wine with my name on it.’”

In a 2008 interview with *Wine Spectator*, MacLachlan explained how the name for Pursued By Bear came about. He was having dinner with a group of friends that included Steve Martin, who suggested the name should be a reference to acting. “And something popped into my head. There’s this wonderful Shakespearean stage direction: ‘Exit, pursued by a bear,’ from *The Winter’s Tale*, and Steve said, ‘That’s it!’ The only problem is that I have to tell the backstory a lot.”

**K**yle Merritt MacLachlan was born in Yakima, Wash., in 1959. His father, Kent, was a lawyer turned stockbroker, and his mother, Catherine, worked for the local school district. Two younger brothers, Craig and Kent Jr., completed the family. “Dad practiced law for a couple of years, hated it, and became a stockbroker, which allowed him to play golf in the afternoons. It suited his lifestyle,” says MacLachlan, who picked up his golf habit from him.

The MacLachlan boys spent the summers helping their father tend the apple trees, vegetables and flowers in the family’s backyard. “We were free labor,” he jokes. “No, actually, we all loved it, so farming was already in my blood.”

The Washington wine industry was just establishing itself in the late 1970s, so MacLachlan’s parents drank Paul Masson or Bud-

weiser. When his friends in high school were chugging beer, MacLachlan discovered wine through a girlfriend’s family. “They had proper sit-down dinners, and we were allowed one glass of wine,” he recalls. “And it was great, because wine for me started with food. It was a California Chardonnay. I remember feeling so grown up.”

He continued the tradition on dates with his girlfriend, convincing someone of age to buy them a bottle—typically Blue Nun, an inexpensive and slightly sweet white that was popular at the time. “That’s all we could afford,” he says. “We would do a picnic. It was very romantic and in a cemetery.” He smiles wryly. “But it was a very beautiful cemetery, and, more importantly, there was a little area in the back surrounded by trees that was quite private. You can, well, imagine the rest.”

MacLachlan went on to study acting at the University of Washington, graduating in 1982, and in the meantime took roles at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and at other regional theaters. He was performing in a production of Molière’s *Tartuffe* in Seattle when

a casting agent tapped him to play Paul Atreides, the hero of director David Lynch’s 1984 adaptation of *Dune*.

Although the movie was a disappointment at the box office, it launched MacLachlan’s career and began a collaboration with Lynch that included movies, TV and wine. In 1983, after MacLachlan screen-tested for *Dune*, Lynch sent a bottle of Lynch Bages to his hotel room. “It must have been a 1980 or 1979. The Kyle today would recall but the Kyle back then was clueless.”

Not only do Lynch and MacLachlan still exchange bottles of Lynch Bages on occasion, but it set the path for the actor’s love of

wine. Throughout the 1990s, he explored the wines of the world and developed a particular passion for Cabernet Sauvignon. Living in Los Angeles, he gravitated toward Napa Valley in the late 1990s, where he met Colgin and Mark Aubert, her winemaker at the time, who were working out of a custom-crush facility.

“That was my first inkling about the possibility of one day making wine on my own,” MacLachlan says. “I realized you don’t need a winery. You don’t need a forklift or even to own the land. And it started to percolate.” Yet the cost of making wine in Napa was prohibitive even then. It was MacLachlan’s wife, producer Desiree Gruber, who pointed him back to his native state. “Napa’s not the story,” she told him. “The story is Washington.” A chance meeting with vintner Eric Dunham set the wheels in motion.

Together they launched Pursued By Bear with a 2005 Cabernet, producing 300 cases at Dunham’s winery from his own vineyard sources. MacLachlan, who is accustomed to reading reviews about his movies and TV shows, recalls the excitement of reading the first review of his wine, a 91-point rating from Harvey Steiman, who was covering Washington for *Wine Spectator* at the time. “It was like, ‘Wow, we’re real. Now we’re in the game.’ And I haven’t really looked back.”

In the early days, MacLachlan let Dunham handle most of the

working details of the business, but that changed when Dunham died unexpectedly in 2014. Wampfler, who was Dunham’s winemaker at the time, ensured that winemaking would remain consistent, but MacLachlan knew he had to step up. “I became more and more the master of my own destiny,” he says. “I started paying more attention to vineyard sites and looking at new vineyard sources. It was time to sail my own ship.”

MacLachlan splits his time between Los Angeles and New York but connects with his winemakers every few days and visits Walla Walla frequently. During the recent actors’ strike, he was able to focus on the winery and spend more time with Desiree and their teen son, Callum, who’s an avid surfer.

He continually seeks new challenges in wine. An estate vineyard is a possibility, and his goal is to plant in the increasingly coveted Mill Creek area of Walla Walla. Pursued By Bear Chardonnay was launched with the 2022 vintage, and new vineyard sources will soon make it a Yakima Valley bottling. A Merlot is also on the way. “I never thought I’d ever have this many wines,” he says.

Yakima bred, MacLachlan feels at home in Walla Walla, and Washington’s wine community has embraced him. “One of the things I have always been impressed about Kyle is his humbleness,” says Leonetti winemaker Chris Figgins. “He’s Eastern Washington through and through and a valuable member of our Walla Walla wine community.” As Wampfler puts it, “If you didn’t know what he did for a living in Hollywood, you could never tell.”

For his part, MacLachlan enjoys his life as a vintner, whether pouring at tastings, visiting sommeliers during his travels or attending events, including the Auction of Washington Wines this past August. “You become part of a group, you know, we’re here together. I talk to other winemakers, and this is about raising the bar for everyone in Washington state.” □

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



**94 ArPePe Valtellina Superiore Grumello Sant'Antonio Riserva 2016 \$120** ITALY Dense and layered, this opens nicely with air in the glass, revealing flavors of dried raspberry, eucalyptus, leather and black tea enmeshed with a core of firm tannins. This wine's flavors expand, carried by sleek acidity and fine, chalky tannins and backed by hints of red licorice, dried sage, date and cocoa powder that play on the persistent finish. Offers muscular tannins that are nicely burnished to give this a substantial yet not too grippy frame, while notes of dark chocolate, black licorice and generous grilled garrigue cruise alongside a steely ballast of iron. Hints of dried flowers and savory orange peel acidity perk up the concentrated core. Best from 2025 through 2045.—K.B.



**97 E. Guigal Côte-Rôtie La Landonne 2019 \$700** FRANCE Firing on all cylinders, this simmers with massive power and range. Boasts a dark, brooding core of black plum, fig paste, strappy black licorice and fruitcake flavors supported by a formidable iron spine. Chewy in feel, with grilled aniseed and warm mesquite smoke adding salty sweetness. Though its tannins are mellowing, this still has a lifetime ahead in the cellar. A show-stopper. Best from 2025 through 2040.—K.B.



**96 Clos des Papes Châteauneuf-du-Pape 2021 \$120** FRANCE Elegant and approachable, this stunning red offers seductive aromatics of smoked incense and red tea, with floral high notes, followed by a well of cassis, licorice and red currant flavors coated in graphite. Dusty in feel, with fine-grained tannins bringing structure and textural complexity, while an iron element lingers on the very long finish. Grenache, Syrah and Mourvèdre. Drink now through 2035. 6,000 cases made, 750 cases imported.—K.B.

## How We Do the Tastings

*Wine Spectator* editors taste more than 11,000 wines each year. Wines are tasted in our offices in New York and Napa, Calif. Tastings are also conducted on location in various European winegrowing regions.

All tastings are conducted in private, under controlled conditions. Wines are always tasted blind, in flights organized by varietal, appellation or region. Bottles are bagged and coded. Tasters are told only the general type of wine (varietal or region) and the vintage. Price is not taken into account. Each tasting begins with a wine previously rated, which is tasted non-blind as a reference point. Other already-rated wines are inserted into the blind tasting to ensure consistency. A typical tasting session consists of 20 to 30 wines, with a maximum of two sessions per day. We retaste many wines to confirm impressions, always in subsequent blind tastings.

Notes and ratings are entered directly into our database prior to the removal of the bags. Additional comments may be added to a note after the identity of the wine is revealed, but the score is never changed.

## Featured Wines: Spectator Selections, Labels and Photographs

Each issue, our editors choose wines with special qualities; called Spectator Selections, they are highlighted in the first pages of this Buying Guide, along with their labels. The categories are described below. In addition, selected reviews throughout the Buying Guide include a photograph of a winery principal, presenting these producers in a more personal way. All labels and images are chosen by *Wine Spectator* for editorial purposes only and do not represent any commercial transaction between *Wine Spectator* and the producers whose wines are featured.

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## Follow That Bubbly! Champagne Saved in High-Speed Chase


**H**oliday season is high time for Champagne—apparently, both for wine lovers and wine thieves. In France, several suspects attempted an *Ocean’s Eleven*-style heist of two truckloads of Moët & Chandon in November, but when French police pursued them, it turned into a high-speed chase worthy of a *Fast & Furious* movie.

In the early hours of Nov. 11, the thieves snuck into the lot of a logistics company in an industrial zone on the outskirts of the French town of Reims in the heart of the Champagne region. There, they stole two semitrucks loaded with more than \$600,000 worth of Moët & Chandon. They drove off at a leisurely, nothing-to-see-here-folks pace, headed for Paris.

Despite their careful preparation, they had not counted on GPS tracking devices. The trucks’ change in location eventually triggered an alarm, alerting the police. An hour and 85 miles later, local cops swung into action, picking up the convoy near the town of Gretz-Armainvilliers, where it had joined the highway leading to the capital.

The first driver, apparently unimpressed by the motor power under the hood of the cop car, tried to outrun the law. When that didn’t work, he attempted to run the police off the road. Traffic forced him to slow, at which point, with the truck going about 10 miles per hour, a white BMW pulled up next to the cab, and the truck’s driver leapt into the car. Focused on preventing the truck from hitting any innocents, one officer climbed out, jogged alongside the still-rolling truck, jumped in and hit the brakes. In the chaos, the BMW disappeared.

Meanwhile, the second truck swerved off the highway, smashed through



traffic barriers, pulled into a service station and stopped. By the time police got to it, it was unoccupied. Investigators have not yet identified the thieves, but the cargo survived, intact and ready for the holidays.

This is not the first autumn bubbly heist. In October 2022, another well-orchestrated plot targeted 800 cases of G.H. Martel Champagne worth roughly \$200,000. The stolen truck used to haul away the bubbly cargo was later found abandoned near Paris. Investigators traced the Champagne to a warehouse south of the city, where they arrested several suspects, who had managed to sell 600 cases. The original thieves were never identified. Could there be a gang with a taste for Champagne still on the loose?

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## Chef José Andrés’ *Feeding Dangerously* Celebrates a New Kind of Superhero


**V**eteran comic book author Steve Orlando’s first meeting with his new co-author, famed chef José Andrés, didn’t happen in an office or one of Andrés’ restaurants. It was in the middle of the action, distributing food with Andrés’ World Central Kitchen (WCK) in the aftermath of Hurricane Michael in Florida in 2018. “Being on the ground with José side by side and getting things done with him [allowed me] to put my own hands in the dirt,” said Orlando, whose credits include Wonder Woman, Spider-Man and Batman.

Andrés and Orlando’s new hardcover graphic novel, *Feeding Dangerously*

(TKO Studios, 240 pages, \$45), follows the growth of WCK, Andrés’ humanitarian organization, which has distributed more than 300 million meals to communities in crisis, including in Ukraine, Florida and Maui. WCK receives a \$5 donation for each book sold. Beginning with Andrés’ own journey to the United States, *Feeding Dangerously* goes on to recall many of the crises that inspired WCK’s development. “It felt exciting to me to write about [WCK] ... good and heroism that isn’t hypothetical, that isn’t unattainable,” shared Orlando.

Andrés, a self-proclaimed comic-book nerd, is a big fan of Japanese manga. “What I love about comics is the emotion ... Boom! Zam! Whoa! Steve [Orlando] and Alberto Ponticelli—the amazing illustrator—really captured the intensity, the very vivid moments, of what it is like in the middle of disaster and in that moment of darkness when a shining, beautiful glimmer of hope emerges,” Andrés told *Wine Spectator*. “I have seen how, in the worst moments, that is when the best of humanity can show up.”
